Arson suspected in Ap 30 fire near Staples

On Sunday, April 30 at approximately 6:42 p,m, the Todd County Sheriff's Office received multiple reports of a grass/swamp fire just east of Staples on the Todd Line Road (Warner Road). The Staples Fire Department responded and were able to quickly head off the fire limiting the area involved.

Deputies arrived and processed the scene. Based on evidence located at the scene it is believed that the fire is the result of arson.

Due to the fire conditions and high wind if the Staples Fire Dept. hadn't stopped the fire quickly it would have rapidly spread throughout the large swamp that runs along the east side of Staples between Todd Line Road and Hwy. 10.

The Staples Fire Dept. was assisted by the Motley Fire Dept. and the MN DNR Forestry Division.

Further forensic processing will be conducted

on the evidence recovered

at the scene. Smoke shop permit denied for second time

The Staples City Council denied an application for a tobacco license for a second time, again based on a background check done by the Staples Police Department.

At their April 25 meeting, the council got a second application from Othman Doudin for a tobacco license for the building at 215 2nd Ave. NE in Staples.

Police Chief Melissa Birkholtz submitted a letter saying that they did a background check.

'After careful review of the application, I find the applicant, Doudin, still in an ineligible status," said the letter from Birkholtz.

Chief Birkholtz was not

at the meeting, but at a previous meeting she said the police background check finds information that is not available to the public and some of which can not be released to the public because it is private infor-

A Minnesota court records online search did not have any evidence of Doudin being involved in any court cases.

This is the second time the smoke shop license was denied because of the background check. The Staples-Motley School District has also objected to opening a smoke shop in the building, citing studies that show an increase in teen smoking and vaping when there is a smoke shop near a school.

New tobacco ordinance

The council passed the first reading to approve changes to the city's tobacco ordinance.

The new language would prevent the sale of tobacco and related devices to more than 300 feet from a school building. There was also changes in the ordinance regarding the license application, to make sure that the person applying is the person who will be operat-

ing the business. The board received a map showing the proposed smoke shop building is just outside of the 300 foot no-sale zone. City Administrator Jerel Nelsen pointed out that the school is plan-

Council member Brenda Borash optimistic about Motley's future

It's been nearly five months since Brenda Borash took the oath of office to serve on the Motley City Council. She's glad she did

Borash was elected to her four-year seat last November and was sworn into office in January of 2023. She joined other newly elected officials Mayor Mike Schmidt and council member Nikki Bjerga, both of whom had served on an interim basis since the summer of 2022. Introductory stories on Schmidt and Bjerga had been shared in the Staples World at that time

During a recent interview, Borash said that both she and her husband, Jason Borash, have always been very involved in their community. She noted that over the years they've served on a number of organizations together, including as Cub Scout and Boy Scout leaders for Troop 51 in Little Falls.

When Jason, who now serves as the Motley Police Chief, first became an officer on the department, Brenda said she naturally wanted to join him in serving that community. "Jason and I have been helping with June Fest for four or five years," Borash said of Motley's annual festival which brings hundreds of visitors to town each year. She's excited to be part of the efforts to make their town stronger and more inviting, and is happy for the opportunity to serve side-by-side with her husband once again.

She has strong roots in the area, having grown up in Staples (her maiden name's Fonteyn), graduating from Staples-Motley High School in 1991. Borash later attended school in

Waseca, where she studied garden center/landscaping. She worked as a floral designer for a stint, while at the same time attending night school for accounting. "That's when I got into insurance," Borash said, adding that for the past 19 years she's worked for North Risk Partners as a risk advisor for personalized insurance. "I office between Little Falls and Wadena," she said.

When asked what she likes best about her job, Borash said, "problem solving and the people...getting to know all kinds of people."

These are some of the same things she's been enjoying during her short time on the council. Borash noted that she's had the opportunity to talk with people around town and get their perspective on issues, and she hopes to do more of that as time goes on. And

as the council liaison to the Public Works Department, Borash said she's spent time with Public Works Director Bruce Brotherton, to better understand what his job entails. "It was very interesting," Borash said, of learning about the water treatment and wastewater treatment facilities.

Shortly after her appointment to the council, Borash attended a League of Minnesota two-day training, which she found to be very helpful. The seminar leaders stressed the importance of touring the city, as well as spending time with each of the department heads to have a better understanding of what they do and why they need the things they ask for.

While at the seminar, Borash said she also learned what things she can and cannot do as a council member who is married to the town's police chief. If any issue being discussed or voted on could benefit them financially, "Then I can't talk," Borash said. For example, if the council were voting on a salary raise for the police chief, she'd have to abstain from voting.

Prior to running for city council, Brenda said she'd asked her husband if he thought it would be an issue, should she be elected. "I was impressed with his answer," Brenda said, going on to explain that basically his advice to her was to "do what's best for the city," even if it doesn't align with his thoughts or feelings.

Reflecting on these first months serving on the council, Borash said she believes they have a very strong leader in Mayor Mike Schmidt and is encouraged to see the direction the city is taking. She's spoken with a variety of residents who've voiced their excitement about the

leadership.

In addition to the council's leadership, Borash expressed praise for the city's police department. "I'm impressed with the amount of drugs Motley is getting off the streets," she said, going on to note that it's a lot, especially considering they are a small town with two officers. As she thinks about the drug situation in the area, it makes her angry and scared at the same time.

When asked what it's like to be married to someone in law enforcement, Borash said that, naturally, she's concerned every time Jason gets a call, especially with increased news of police officers killed in the line of duty. Things have changed a lot over the past two years, she said.

She's comforted to know that law enforcement is something Jason's always felt called to do and she fully supports his role as police chief.

So, what does she do in her free time? "I love to fish...it's my stress reliever,' Borash said. She also loves to garden and is looking forward to planting flowers in the near future. Spending time with friends and family is at the top of her list as well. "Family is very important to me," Borash said, adding that she and Jason have two adult children, and she has family living in her hometown of Staples.

Borash is looking forward to the future of Motley and for the continued opportunity to serve on the council. She welcomes feedback from residents and said that if anyone would like to reach her on any Motley city issue, they can email her at motley-council.brenda@gmail.com.



CLC focuses on student needs, campus connections

Central Lakes College is more than a place to come, get an education and leave. It's home. A family. It's about connection. When students are here, we want them to be able to concentrate on their studies and not to have to worry about things like where their next meal is coming from. That's why we've placed an emphasis on supplying basic needs to our students who need it. Students across both our Staples and Brainerd campuses struggle at times with having their basic needs met. When that happens, students tell us it's difficult to focus, learn and to feel like they belong.

Through listening sessions, surveys and conversations with our students, it became clear that some of the barriers that impact student learning and student success include food insecurity, increasing mental health needs, lack of childcare, housing and transportation, and access to health services. Students also said they would like more supports around energy assistance, health insur-

ance, financial literacy and support for our growing LGBTQ+ community.

Our Student Life Department has provided leadership to create a student center, called The Hub, to serve as the go-to spot for resources like the food pantry, a mental health center with a social worker, clinical therapist and trained student mental health guides, and community resources. These resources include a partnership with Bridges of Hope, which offers community resource connections, Lutheran Social Services, offering resources for energy assistance, Affinity Plus, which provides financial literacy support and education, the WeARE Clinic, which offers sexual health services, STI testing, assists with vaccinations, provides a variety of educational sessions and will soon to offer additional health services.

Building connection within the college community increases student success, but also provides students with leadership, service, relationship, team building and life skills. In addition to academic coursework, our students engage with faculty, staff and community in the following areas:

We have seven sports teams, which include football, volleyball, basketball, softball, baseball and trap shooting.

· Performing Arts and Verse Like Water programs provide opportunities for broad engagement.

· Student Life supports our Outdoor Recreation Center, events and activities for students. We have close to 30 diverse Student Clubs. If students don't see one they like, they can create their own with the support of a staff or faculty member.

We have a strong student government organization. Student voices are essential.

· Cultural Thursday programs continue to educate, inspire and challenge us.

Our new multicultural center, The Nest, encourages student engagement, hosts trainings and speakers, and will be offering cultural barbering every week.

• Our new Esports Lounge provides a gaming space where students can play casually or competitively. It is one of the fastest growing college sports.

No conflict of interest

An editorial opinion piece published on April 19 referred to my role in a recent discussion among the Motley City Council of an item approving the Motley Police Department's purchase of a second squad car. The author of the piece implied that my participation as a councilor in this matter represented a conflict of interest or even raised a concern about ethics, because my spouse is Jason Borash, the city's chief of police.

Prior to my participation and vote, I researched current Minnesota law and found MN Statute 471.87, titled "Minnesota's Conflict of Interest Law," that states "A public officer who has authority to take part in making any sale, lease,

or contract in his or her official capacity, shall not voluntarily have a personal financial interest in that sale, lease, or contract or personal benefit financially from it."

Neither I nor my husband have a personal financial interest in the matter of a new city vehicle purchase, so there was no need to recuse myself or seek additional opinion. The matter involved a business decision that benefits the city - not a decision that would result in personal gain or benefit.

My contribution to the discussion of issues before the council is an expectation of my job duties as a representative of Motley residents. Because the statute is clear in intent, there was not presence of conflict of interest, and no law was being violated, it seemed unnecessary for council deliberation about the appropriateness of my vote.

Serving my community as a new city councilor is a job I take very seriously and with great pride. To help my understanding of my proper roles and responsibilities, I voluntarily attended a twoday educational workshop for newly elected officials presented by the League of Minnesota Cities shortly after taking office.

Veterans elgible for **PACT Act benefits**

From the muddy fields of Vietnam to the sands of Afghanistan and Iraq, our servicemembers and veterans have always answered the call, fighting valiantly for our country at great personal risk. Over time, we have seen the severe and lasting consequences of their sacrifices—and in particular, their exposure to toxic substances. Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange experience high levels of hypertension, and those who were exposed to toxic burn pits in the Middle East have gone on to suffer illnesses from asthma and rhinitis to severe cancers. For too long, it's been nearly impossible to get care for those conditions through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

It's always been my belief that when our servicemembers and veterans signed up to serve, there was no waiting line, so when they come home, there shouldn't be a waiting line to access the benefits they deserve. That is why I spent many years working alongside Minnesota veterans and veteran families to make sure veterans suffering from exposure-related illnesses could get care through the VA. We made a huge stride forward with last year's enactment

of the PACT Act, a landmark bill that expands VA health care and benefits for veterans exposed to Agent Orange, burn pits and other toxic substances. The legislation included provisions from my bipartisan bill to improve education and training for VA health care personnel.

The PACT Act increases VA health care and benefit eligibility for 3.5 million veterans spanning the Vietnam, Gulf, Afghanistan, and Iraq wars, including an estimated 294,000 Minnesota veterans. Passing that bill was a hard-won accomplishment, and now I am focused on making sure that Minnesota veterans know how to access the benefits they are finally eligible for.

A museum can teach humility as well as biology

There is much that can be learned in a museum. This is especially true if its theme and subjects align with your interests. Sometimes, though, a person discovers that what they thought was of little interest, can actually prove fascinating. For me, visiting the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland, Ohio, was not on my bucket list. But it turned out to be full of nostalgia to see up close the artifacts and memorabilia of the musicians who wrote, sang, and played the soundtracks of my youth. My wife spent a career as an art teacher, while I, on the other hand, can barely

draw a stick Inside the figure. Yet **Outdoors** in art museums I have found myself marveling at what sculp tor could

chisel out of a block marble. what a painter Mike Rahn could convey with a

brush and canvas, and how ancient cultures expressed their views of life and the world

through their art. Other museums would be slam-dunk favorites. For an outdoors person like me, steeped in a life of angling, hunting, and fascinated by science and nature, a visit to a natural history museum can be like an expedition to places either familiar or exotic, and a time machine that can take one to other epochs in the history of our planet, revealing their many and marvelous natural processes and life

I recently visited the new Bell Museum on the University of Minnesota's St. Paul campus. "New" may be a misnomer, and so—in a way—is its current name. The museum's St. Paul campus home opened in 2018, but its life began decades ago as the James Ford Bell Museum of Natural History, at that time located across town on the University's Minneapolis Campus.

Its namesake, James Ford Bell, was a passionate conservationist who was the founder of the cereal and grain processing giant General Mills, and who donated half of the funds needed to construct the Minneapolis campus building, which opened in 1940. Fast-forward to the 21st century, when—faced with an aging and maintenance-heavy structure, and a desire by museum leadjects presented—a major fund-raising campaign led to the museum's new home and name in 2018.

In its first life, and now in the museum's new location, the museum features scenes of Minnesota's many varied landscapes, and their many wild creatures and plant life. These landscapes are depicted in dioramas that combine painted backgrounds, taxidermy specimens of creatures as small as chipmunks and as large as bull moose, and landforms and vegetation made of castings, wax, and other materials that look truly alive. These dioramas were mostly created during the 1930s for the museum building that opened in 1940, the work of acclaimed artist Francis Lee Jacques, in collaboration with artist and diorama maker—and longtime museum director—Dr.

Walter Breckenridge. As a student at "the U," more decades ago than I care to admit, I often visited that original museum during midday breaks between classes. So realistic and detailed are its dioramas—then and now—that you could sit on the builtin benches opposite them and easily imagine that you were on the shore of Lake Superior, or on the edge of a beaver pond, or out on the western Minnesota prairie. What a great temporary escape these dioramas were from the milling crowds of fellow students, the pressures of professors' expectations, and the cares of everyday life.

A highlight of the new museum is a life-size reconstruction of the now-extinct wooly mammoth. This elephant-like, elephant-size mammal, cloaked with a dense protective fur layer and armed with enormous curving tusks, roamed the northern regions of North America—including Minnesota—Europe, and Asia until about 10,000 years ago.

Like the first humans to arrive in North America, the wooly mammoth is believed to have migrated here over the Bering Land Bridge, the land connection that temporarily joined North America and Russia when ocean levels were much lower during the last

Small remnant populations clung to existence as late as 4,000 years ago, in such isolated locations as Russia's Wrangel Island, and mainland Siberia. That's little more than the blink of an eye in the hisory of life on our planet The wooly mammoth's extinction is thought to have been caused by some combination of warming climate, and the growing presence and effectiveness of human hunting of the huge beasts for food.

Modern humans have had an unusual window into the nature of the wooly mammoth, much more revealing than what we know of many other long-extinct creatures. We not only have fossils dating back many thousands of years, but also deep-frozen specimens that have been found in several far northern locations. locked in perpetual ice for these millennia. Still more unusual, one wooly mammoth specimen found in Poland was mummified in a liquid petroleum seep.

I'm humbled when I visit places like the Bell Museum. Humbled when I consider the long sweep of life on our planet, the diversity of creatures that exist not only now, but that preceded our own kind in millennia past: some that were never seen by our human ancestors before they passed into history.

Humans and our ancestors have existed for but a tiny fraction of the history of life on earth. Our species, Homo sapiens, is less than 200,000 years old, while the first mammals appeared 225 million years ago. As legitimate as it is for us to rely on other creatures to make our lives possible—to feed us, clothe us, or pull a plow to turn the soil for our agrarian forebears—other creatures are important in their own right; not just for their value and usefulness to us.



An Ode to the Reading of Good Books

What does your reading pile look like? I am truly grateful to people who put me on to "good reading." Good books seem to gain value when they come recommended through the life stories of other people.

We will come back to the "Good Book" shortly, but I am intrigued by how the apostle Paul, of whom God used to write sacred Scripture, was obviously a reader of other important literature.

In Acts 17;28, Paul obviously was aware of key poetry, as he quotes from the Cilician Stoic philosopher Aratus In II Timothy 4:13, the apostle Paul tells his understudy Timothy, "When you come, bring the cloak I left with Carpus at Troas, and my scrolls, especially the parchments." Yes, some of these may have been Scripture, but some theologians see a reference to other reading material also.

So let's ask again, what does your reading pile look like? We understand that this venue includes various options for E-reading also. But the bot-

tom line is "what are we feeding our minds?" May I make a confession? I have succumbed to reading very good and wholesome material, but start realizing that it's at the cost of giving the priority focus and time to "The Good Book," that we know as the Bible. All reading needs to be evaluated through the lens of the Bible and not the other way around.

It is only truly "good reading" if it consciously and intentionally is surrendered to and evaluated by the Bible. We are a culture in deep trouble (and the church isn't exempt) in the increasing preoccupation with human ideas at the expense of hungering to hear from God in His Word. The lowest common denominator of human whim (of which we wrongly call it "enlightenment") is destroying our lives and those around us. So let's return to and recapture the place of "good and wholesome" reading that are vessels to coming to God.





Feedlot meeting focused on swine, cattle markets

The Todd County Annual presentation he discussed Feedlot Meeting was back in action again in 2023 with "This Little Piggy Went to Market." There were 140 people in attendance for the meeting that was held at the Clarissa Ballroom on March 15, 2023.

Ross Nadgwick from Van Ahn & Company out of Alexandria presented on the livestock futures markets. His presentation outlined the seasonal trends of the cattle and swine markets and how the current market compares to historic market trends. His presentation also touched on the corn market and how it relates to the cattle and swine markets as that is the main source of feed for these commodities.



and record keeping. 4. Manure application records shall be supplied to the County Feedlot Officer

annually.

5. Prior to manure application event, an air quality exemption shall be called in to the County Feedlot Program.

6. Manure nutrient testing shall be conducted annually prior to manure application.

7. Two rows of trees shall be planted on the north and east sides of the proposed building location for the purposes of screening.

8. Establishment of a road maintenance agreement with Little Elk Township to address road damage both during and after construction.

9. Mandatory use of pit additives for odor control and establishment of biofilters or advanced technology on pit fans for additional active odor control.

10. Applicant must abide by all other applicable federal, state and local standards.

• Approved using ARPA funds for the project of cover and closure of cells at the Todd County Landfill, as recommended by the ARPA **Environmental Resources** Committee.

Background: The Todd County Demolition Landfill requires cover and closure of cells, in compliance with MPCA rules. The ARPA **Environmental Resources** Committee has rated this project as #1 priority, and recommends use of ARPA funds for this project.




The department needs to receive authorization soon so that the work can be advertised for bidding early in the construction season.
