Conditions placed on shoreland lot request

A request from Douglas and Carol Lien to plat 30.36 acres into 20 non-riparian lots to be known as DC Lien Addition in Shoreland-GD Zoning was approved by the Planning Commission on

Nov. 5, 2020.

This was brought before the Todd County Board of Commissioners on Nov. 17, 2020 where it was remanded back to the Planning Commission.

The item was then further reviewed by the Planning Commission on Dec. 3 and again on Jan. 7, 2021.

The final recommendation of the Planning Commission was to approve the Preliminary Plat with conditions, including a wetland delineation plan, storm water management plan, a public right-of-way (ROW) turn around area at the east end of Fawn Drive, 6. no residential development on lots 1 through 7.

When it came before the county commissioners again at their Jan. 19 meeting, it was discussed at great length with particular concerns about the cul-desac and the increase of traffic through the area.

Chair Barb Becker said that they could not get a recommendation from Leslie Township because they were not meeting until that evening.

Attorney Jason Kuboushek fielded several questions related to cul-de-

sac changes.

Commissioner Randy
Neumann explained that

Fawn Drive is a public road ROW that is partially privately maintained on one side of the ravine and the other is a public road ROW that is maintained by the

township.
"We are not the road authority there. The township is," said Neumann.

He added that the commissioners were trying to do what was right, but that they couldn't keep using 1930s mentality because people didn't want traffic.

Kuboushek said that while the county could request that a developer pays for a portion of a road upgrade, they could not ask that the developer pay for all of it. He also said that because a culvert should be put in at the ravine, the county would have a hard time rationalizing making

the developer pay for that.

Neumann said his parents had been told they had to put in and pay for a cul-desac when they were making their plat. Kuboushek said that the developer would be bearing the cost for the cul-de-sac.

With only ten days left of the 120 days that the county has to make a decision on a preliminary plat, Becker asked if they should meet on Friday, Jan. 22 as this would give time for Leslie County to hold their meeting and make their recommendations.

Commissioner David Kircher said that no one from the township had returned a call to him thus

far.

He asked if because this was a "preliminary plat" if

they could wait until the

final plat to put further con ditions on the plat.

Kuboushek said that during this stage, the board has the most power to be able to set conditions. He stated that the final plat process is for making sure the conditions have been met and that conditions had to be set at the preliminary

stage.

Neumann expressed concerns that the Planning Commission had to make decisions on plats without having all of the informa tion and then they send it to the board of commission ers and "we don't have all of the information."

Commissioner Rod Erickson asked about the DIRT team meeting.

If the commissioners were to not approve the pre liminary plat by Thursday Jan. 28, the plat would pass without any conditions.

So while the recommen dation from the Planning Commission was to approve the preliminary plat, the commissioners tabled any action until they would meet again on Jan. 22.



If you drive through Motley on a Sunday morning, you just might hear the sound of a bell calling out above the Highway 10 traffic noise, its peals cutting through the howls of the cold winter wind.

"Church bells sound like hope to me," said Robin (Thorn) Kramer, who's been ringing the brass bell at Motley United Methodist Church religiously for the past few months or so.

When in-person worship closed for several weeks during the Covid-19 surge last year, Robin said one of the things she missed most was hearing the sound of the church bell.

She mentioned this to

explaining to him that bells mean 'hope,' something she felt was sorely needed at this time. He gave her his blessing, and she's been ringing the bell on Sundays ever since.

It doesn't erase the pain in the world, but, as Robin says again, the sound of the bell represents hope for tomorrow...much needed

No, it hasn't been the easiest year, as is evidenced by the number of news stories pertaining to the pandemic and political unrest.

Most everyone you talk to these days would like to brush off remnants of 2020, sweep them under the rug and pray that the new year brings happier memories.

That could certainly be true of Robin, whose her pastor, Greg Leslie, 2020 calendar was filled ficult moments, including a run-in with Covid-19 this past November that kept her home sick for two weeks or so.

Undoubtedly, the two most difficult happenings in her life during 2020, however, would be saying 'goodbye' to her beloved husband Tom at his memorial service in early January, and four months later learning that her son-in-law John had been in a tragic motorcycle accident that left him paralyzed.

Some days are harder than others, Robin said recently at her home just south of Motley along the Long Prairie River. She and Tom had moved back to the area a decade ago, having lived in Anoka for 36 years. "We were high school sweethearts," Robin said, noting she had graduated from Motlev High School in 1972.

They were looking forward to spending their retirement years together in their hometown, Robin said. They were active in their community and church, loved spending time outdoors, and theirs was the place their children and grandchildren loved to visit in any season. Having Tom get sick in the fall of 2019 with what they initially thought was pneumonia, only to have him die two days before Christmas after being diagnosed with lung cancer, was nothing she could have prepared for.

In the midst of this time of grief, the pandemic hit, with warnings that people needed to isolate to help reduce the spread of Covid-19. Eventually, her church was closed as well, which meant she no longer had the opportunity to socialize with her friends during coffee hour each Sunday.

And then on May 5, she got the call from her daughter, Jackie, about John's

with its own share of dif- tragic motorcycle accident.

Thankfully, her son-inlaw lived. Robin recalled the many prayers offered on his behalf, and how grateful their family was to the medical staff who attended to John during that traumatic

However, the accident left John paralyzed from the chest down, as well as sustaining a broken back and ribs. During his three months in the hospital he also developed pneumonia and had a tracheostomy procedure to help him breathe. It was difficult to see John in this condition, and to see the pain in the eyes of Jackie and their children as they watched the man they loved suffer.

Prior to this, John, in his 40s, worked as a tile layer and had his own company in the Anoka area. That would all change.

Throughout John's time in the hospital and rehabilitation facility, Robin said she was amazed at the kindness shown to their family by a variety of people... some they had never even

She went on to share that after learning about John's accident, Myhers Construction in Ramsey volunteered to build a maintenance free deck and ramp system for John and Jackie. Along the way, they received support from Grundstrom Construction, WJC Remodeling and Home Depot...ensuring that everything would be handicap accessible when John returned home. They even put in new landscaping, Robin said. All at no cost to the family.

Somewhere along the way, Robin learned that Jesse Grundstrom of Grundstrom Construction, was the son of Toni, a woman she'd offered to make curtains for years ago. Robin went on to explain that Toni's house had very



high ceilings and she'd had trouble finding curtains to fit. She'd been very happy with the curtains Robin made as a gift to her.

When Jesse Grundstrom learned of the connection, he shared with Robin that his mother was now in a wheelchair, due to Multiple Sclerosis. "Isn't it a small world?," Robin recalled him saying to her as they looked at the deck he'd

helped build for John and Jackie.

No, it hasn't been the easiest year by a long shot. But in the midst of a pandemic, with the loss and injury of loved ones endured...these stories of kindness and the good in humanity have helped give Robin hope for tomorrow. That, and the sound of her beloved church bell.



And we celebrate our first African American, first Asian American and first woman Vice President, Kamala Harris, who stands on the shoulders of so many on this platform who have forged the way to this day.



Community survival depends on creating a sense of belonging

My great-grandparents and their fellow community members sought an equitable economic ecosystem - a system that was fair to all, that did not depend on exploitation of many resources and many people for the benefit of a few. The simple, yet powerful act of intentional connection, of welcoming, can begin to open doors to the steady stream of people, ideas, and energy needed to power equitable, inclusive, shared, and sustainable prosperity for all.

We hope you find this guidebook helpful on your own journey towards creating an equitable and inclusive economic ecosystem in your community, geared towards local and regional shared prosperity. Reconciling deficits

Spend now for long term growth

Concord Coalition Executive Director. Bob Bixby. Concord's Policy Director, Tori Gorman, and Director of the Progressive Policy Institute's Center for Funding America's Future, Ben Ritz, discussed a new publication by Ritz on how concerned the public and policymakers should be with federal budget deficits, a process known as reconciliation and how Congress might use it in the coming years, as well as PAYGO standards and COVID relief.

Ritz explained that he sees a difference in how policvmakers should approach short-term and long-term federal budget deficits in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic and economic fallout.

"In the short term, there's actually a bigger risk of doing too little rather than too much," he added. "If we were to spend too little in the short term, we could have longer unemployment than needed, higher poverty rates, and slower future economic growth."

Ritz highlighted the slow growth coming out of the Great Recession (2008) and the early emphasis on correcting growing deficits at that time that ended up hamstringing recovery.

"The recovery was prolonged because we were too tight fisted, and the fears in the short term didn't materialize," he said. "We should have some humility this time around to be a little more aggressive in stimulating the economy before we are concerned about long-term threats."

The conversation also covered changes made by the U.S. House to the pay-asyou-go rule.

"What the House did recently was the right approach," Ritz said. "They maintained the PAYGO principle, but they added two important exceptions: The first is spending to address the coronavirus pandemic ... the other exception for longterm investments to combat climate change is also worthwhile.'


But he explained that

these exceptions should be used in the spirit in which they were designed, as opposed to simply justifying massive new legislation that is merely on topic.

The program also spent a fair amount of time discussing the reconciliation process, which is often used to sidestep filibuster and reduce the threshold of votes to pass legislation, and how it might be used by the new Congress and the incoming Biden administration.

Gorman said a lot depends on how much Republicans in the Senate are willing to cooperate, committee ratios, committee budgets, and rules that will govern the Senate.

"It would be my preference to pass legislation via the regular process, and the reason why is because bipartisan legislation is always the most durable,' Gorman said. "When you try and pass legislation via reconciliation, the dirty little secret is that reconciliation in general produces crappy law.'





"The Deep Need of Physical Human Touch"

I recently had the privilege of having two of our young granddaughters taking turns sitting on my lap in the recliner as we were watching a children's DVD. I have always appreciated those times together. You always need to do it on their terms. But in our ongoing Covid-19 world of social distancing" that has curbed handshakes and hugs, I was savoring all the more the incredible gift from God that appropriate-boundaryhuman-touch is.

It is remarkable to see how this ties into Jesus' miraculous healing powers as so often recorded in the New Testament. There are times in some of His miraculous healings, that he profoundly speaks/ wills the healing to take place and it happens, sometimes long distance as in John 4:43-53 and in Matthew 8:5-13.

Then, there are other healings where, His touch isn't required, but it's very much a part of the "total" healing. Let's look at a few of these examples. In Matthew 8:1-4, Jesus encounters a man with leprosy. We need to remember that lepers were social outcasts. There were stringent guidelines that a person who

was stricken with leprosy needed to follow. It was a whole other level of "social distancing and quarantining!" It was remarkable that he even made it physically to Jesus. But, in fact, the man makes it right to Jesus. Then, Jesus does the unthinkable. In Matthew 8:3 we read, "Jesus stretched out His hand and touches him..." An 'untouchable' was touched. Jesus didn't need to do this to accomplish healing him physically. But the man needed both medical and human touch healing. In Matthew 17:7, Jesus physically touched fear-ridden disciples. Jesus' touches the children in Matthew 19:15. Matthew 14:36 sees yet another angle of how people longed to touch Jesus to be healed. I know we need to continue to be careful, but as

the old phone commercial once said, "reach out and touch someone" in ways that minister to people's isolation needs like cards, phone calls, food drops, invitations to church worship services, running errands for people and... human touch in appropriate ways in our world that right now continues to limit those opportunities. Be creative!


Against WCA/ABE, Colby Tappe and Conner Dobson won by fall, while Jason Trantina had a 6-3



Strickland visited the campus and said he was "blown away" by the football facilities, the coaching staff and the team. He also has a good friend who will be on the team.


"It made me want to be a part of it," he said.




