Parking lot plan approved by school board

The Staples-Motley School Board approved a \$2,273,216 property tax increase to repave all the parking lots on school property. The vote was at the July 19 school board meeting.

The board used tax abatement financing, which identifies parcels in the district that would be sufficient to cover the annual debt service of the project, but the tax is applied to all properties in the district. The estimated tax impact on a home valued at \$125,000 would be \$52 per year. That is the median value of a home in the district, homes valued at a higher rate will pay a

Snook's life transformations are basis for new book about Vietnam, PTSD

Several crossroads in Mike Snook's life could have taken him in the wrong direction that would have ended in disaster. But each time someone or something helped him choose a new path that transformed his life.

First it was Jerry and Maryann Riewer who pulled him out of poverty and allowed him to graduate from Staples High School in 1966. He then went into the U.S. Army and to the Vietnam war. Despite a good business career, he suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) after Vietnam. A chance encounter during a visit back to Vietnam helped him start on a new path away from alcoholism towards being a Born Again Christian.

Snook and his wife Lori are now missionaries with REAP Worldwide, part of the Dave Roever ministry. He also maintains connections to the people of Viet-

Snook has written a new book about his struggles with PTSD and his journey to his current life. It is called "Vietnam Abyss - A Journal of Unmerited Grace." He has donated a copy to the Staples Library and to the Staples World.

Barefoot beginning

Snook got his first big break when he was 15 years old. He had gotten in trouble after he quit school at Deer Creek and stole a pair of shoes from the local bowling alley. He got caught and was sent to jail, so his brother went to the local baseball coach, Jerry Riewer, to help get him out.

"My whole life changed when I moved in," said Snook. "I had no reputation here, I was just Jerry Riewer's kid.'

He learned there was more to living than he had experienced. Maryann left notes around the house to remind Snook to do chores or get himself ready for school. The note might say "sweep the floor" or "be sure to change your socks.' Snook said it was incredibly helpful because he didn't know those were things that people did every day. "I had to learn all that," he said.








The articles from that time period on judge's decisions, staff resignations, financial status, and student enrollment will give you great insight into fact over fiction on Motley's decision to make it as a stand-alone school district. You may find it interesting to note who was on the school board then too. I encourage you, online or in-person, to research for yourself what took place before the consolidation vote.

Study on immigrants, embracing community in rural Minnesota

This spring, my classmates and I at the Hubert H. Humphrey School of Public Affairs completed a capstone thesis project investigating outreach and inclusion efforts among rural Minnesota government officials and community leaders. In partnership with Center for Rural Policy and Development, the Minnesota Council on Latino Affairs, the Council for Minnesotans of African Heritage, and the Council for Asian-Pacific Minnesotans, we focused our research on four rural Minnesota communities with a documented increase children of friends and fam- in immigrant and refugee

> Earlier in the pandemic, the MN Council on Latino Affairs (MCLA) conducted a qualitative survey on Latino perspectives in 2020. The study found that translation services, education, healthcare, social services, taxes, and housing access were among the most pressing issues affecting rural Latinos. There are literally hundreds of ethnicities and languages represented in Greater Minnesota, and the MCLA report provides important insights into the needs and concerns of rural immigrant, refugee and BI-POC communities. Despite differences across ethnicities and identities, the experience of Latino Minnesotans provides an important proxy for investigating immigrant and refugee needs

more broadly. Our capstone research team decided to investigate the local government side of diversity and inclusion outreach. We could then compare these findings with MCLA's survey results.

Our research would involve speaking with twenty government officials and community leaders in four cities across rural Minnesota: Austin (Mower County), Pelican Rapids (Otter Tail County), Willmar (Kandiyohi County) and Worthington (Nobles County).

Interviewees included city council members, school officials, county administrators, city mayors, and police chiefs.

Social cohesion and cultural bias

In our conversations with local officials, we found that white residents' perceptions of local immigrant and refugee groups were especially affected by how recently that immigrant group had arrived coupled with racial/ ethnic bias, but multiple interviewees also cited that attitudes toward immigrant and refugee groups have shifted in a positive direction over time. In three of the four cities we studied. Latino groups were the first to migrate to those communities and have therefore "better assimilated" into the surrounding culture. Interviewees cited newer groups, such as Somali and Karen, have had a "harder time" getting involved and integrated into each town.

Government outreach attitudes and barriers

While some government officials saw specific outreach to immigrant and refugee communities a necessity, others opposed the notion that any one group should receive "special treatment." One official in Austin made it clear that specific outreach to immigrant and refugee groups is an important element of government purview, which is reflected in the city's welcome center and honorary city council seat. In comparison, an official in Worthington stated that it was up to the various immigrant communities to express their needs to local leaders:

'If you don't tell us what the shortcomings are, we won't know that there are shortcomings. So, I'm not shy about putting the responsibility back on other individuals that they need to step up and work with us."

Language and communication

Language and translation were by far the most frequent issue cited in interviews. Because it is expensive to translate government documents, all four cities face barriers in effective communication with populations speaking English as a second language. Given the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the necessity for translation and/ or improved communication only increased. In order to distribute materials in readable languages, cities either allocated additional resources to translation or partnered with local meatpacking employers who have translators on staff. The problem with increasing resources put toward translation is the myriad spoken languages present in each town. For many Latinos even, Spanish is the second language after their native/Indigenous tongue. As such, it is impossible for any city to translate and disseminate documents in every language or to the correct groups.

Representation in government

Although representation within the government remains a challenge for rural communities everywhere, some communities have adopted intentional systems for fostering diverse input into government decisions. The officials brought up three perceived barriers to representation in government (whether for elected or staff positions) for immigrant and refugee groups:

Lack of community interest, which was found among both BIPOC and white residents. Officials cited a gap in immigrant and refugee community interest in government involvement, as well as the needed collaborative action required by local governments to effectively provide for these communities.

A skills mismatch leading to a lack of diversity in employment. Discrepancies between worker qualifications and traditional hiring requirements make it difficult for local governments to consider BIPOC individuals for public positions.

Overburdened BIPOC community leaders. Finally, individual community leaders who are involved in government decisions quickly become overtaxed when stuck representing their entire demographic, despite being just one person.

Rural housing deficit

Greater Minnesota has a well-documented housing deficit, due largely to the inability for municipalities to attract developers. With the cost of materials skyrocketing, and the profit-margin for building much lower in rural areas, cities are struggling to provide not just traditional housing, but housing that meets the different needs of the immigrant and refugee communities. As one Austin City Councilmember succinctly

"Housing is the biggest challenge for refugees. It is easier for someone who has been in America longer to get a house or to get an apartment compared to a refugee who just moved here... [M]ost immigrants who moved to Austin have multi-generation families. You know, they have a family of more than four and more than five. So with housing or apartments built in Austin before they had all those refugees and immigrants, it's all one or two bedrooms or a small house.'

Moving Forward

Rural immigrants and refugees are assets to the communities they live in. These residents provide population density, fill employment gaps, and infuse their new homes with their culture, cuisine, and young people. Without immigrants and refugees, Austin, Pelican Rapids, Willmar, and Worthington would all likely report the same kind of population and economic decline present in smaller cities that have not experienced in-migration.

What our conversations found, though, was that the most successful instances of community cohesion and outreach exist in areas where resources, public-private partnerships, and community voices are all successfully integrated. From Austin's honorary city council seat, to the welcome centers which connect new migrants with social and translation services, there are many instances of promising policies which serve to promote equity, inclusion and togetherness.

Nevertheless, the problems associated with adapting to a new and growing community is not painless, and disagreements on the best path forward exist among even the most well-intentioned community leaders. This report focused on outreach and inclusion efforts on the part of government officials, but there is still room for further research on the strengths and challenges identified in the interviews. Some of those questions for further research include:

What can rural cities do to maximize partnerships with local organizations?

What targeted investments can be made in smaller Minnesota communities to expand their capacity to perform immigrant and refugee inclusion work?

How can the state government invest in immigrant and refugee inclusion in smaller communities where private-sector investment capacity is less robust?

How can a commission build the capacity and consensus necessary to create a strategic plan for inclusion that a city council will carry out?

How can inclusivity-focused commissions communicate with one another and learn from the strategies employed in other Greater Minnesota cities?

How can smaller communities develop formal partnerships with clearly defined roles in order to better serve their immigrant and refugee communities?

Do JBS, Hormel, Jennie-O, and West Central Turkeys have the capacity to ramp up their investments in providing services for their workforce and the greater immigrant and refugee community?

The task of thinking through immigration's impact on the social fabric of Greater Minnesota and fully addressing the community needs that arise from these changes is a complicated yet pressing issue. Local governments have the ability to build community through embracing difference, though this can only occur through significant government investment and community collaboration. While the sample cities discussed in this report have all worked to make immigrants and refugees feel welcome. there is more that can and should be done in communi-

"Daily Prayer"

"The apostles gathered together with Jesus and reported all they had done and taught.

He said to them, 'Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while.' People were coming and going in great numbers, and they had no opportunity even to eat.

So they went off in the boat by themselves to a deserted place" (Mark 6:30-32).

The Greek word we translate as "apostle" literally means "one sent on mission." In this short passage, the apostles have just returned from mission and Jesus pulls them away to a place of "rest." It is like when Elijah the prophet sought God's presence in the wind, earthquake and fire, but only in the "quiet" was He found (1 Kings 19:12-13). Do you take time to "be still and know that [He is] God" (Psalm 46:10)? How can you hope to lead someone else to a place you do go yourself? So, be sure to take time for daily prayer.

Our benevolent God has a beautiful Plan in which we are all given some part. Through our fidelity in discerning that part and living it joyfully,

He accomplishes far greater and more beautiful things than we could ever imagine on our own. But we cannot begin being faithful to a Plan we know nothing about. So, as those first apostles began their mission from and returned to their Lord, so should we remember that mission does not precede our relationship with Him, but proceeds from it and returns us to Him.

Now more than ever, the world needs Him in whom we find our hope. Be sure that you are spending time with Him in prayer each day so you can be prepared to do great things.

That in all things, God may be glorified.

a case of "don't let it happen again," Snook learned a lesson when the coach said 'Well, you'll have to sit out tonight's game."

It was a lesson that both Snook and Riewer still remember to this day.

Before leaving Staples, Snook taught the Riewers' son John how to ride a bike.

Snook joined the U.S. Army in 1967 and served until 1969, battling through the toughest years in Viet-

After the army, Snook had a good career with Western Electric and AT&T for 27 years, then worked at Sprint for 6 years. During that time he went back to college to earn bachelor's, masters and doctorate

He married and started a family of his own. He was living the American dream until his demons caught up to him.


Revisiting Vietnam

Snook got divorced in 1997, with PTSD and alcoholism contributing to the relationship problems. He had spent 18 years sober with the help of Alcoholics Anonymous, but he said "I had a psychotic break.

Even while he was drinking and suffering from PTSD issues, Snook knew he had a special connection with Vietnam. He had learned the language while in the Army and felt a connection to the people. In his book he says "When I am there, I feel needed, unique, important and useful. I love the country, the language and the people."

After his divorce, Snook traveled back to Vietnam and "tried to drink myself to death," he said. "I had a lot of PTSD issues.

He made a plan to take a boat up the Mekong River and walk off into the jungle, never to return. He even bought a boat ticket and was drinking in a bar before his trip the next day. A caucasian woman came into the bar, a very unusual sight in 1998, and they started talking. She wouldn't drink because she was in Alcoholics Anonymous. She didn't have a place to stay so he allowed her to use the extra bed in his room. The next morning she was gone but had left a note telling him

she would see him at an AA meeting. She ended it with one of the phrases used in AA: "God works in mysterious wavs.'

That note started another transformation in Snook's

"I broke down and started crying," said Snook. He had been a Buddhist, but that episode started him on a path back to AA and eventually back to Jesus. "Now I am born again," said Snook.

He now thinks of the woman as an angel sent by God to give him the opportunity to choose life.

Redemption

Snook's book is mainly journal entries as he struggles with PTSD, his troubled return to Vietnam and his renewed commitment to

Now he has transformed his life again and is doing mission work both in the United States and in Vietnam. In 2009 he was a pioneer teacher for the first Christian school in Vietnam and he is still connected with many of the students

He and his new wife Lori are missionaries in the Dave Roever organization (pronounced the same as Riewer). They work with REAP, the Christian arm of the organization. Roever is a Vietnam veteran himself who was burned in an accident during the war.

Lori said "The ultimate healing with any veteran is

One of Snook's programs is to take veterans back to Vietnam to help them heal. Snook said many veterans still have PTSD that stems from a specific place in Vietnam. When Snook takes them back to see the area

they served, they learn that things have improved and it is now a beautiful country.

"It changes the picture they have of it, and it changes who they are,' said Snook. Many of the veterans had never talked about their Vietnam experience, but they feel the burden lifted after revisiting the country. Some have seen their PTSD symptoms vanish after the trip.

Snook can also help veterans trace their army careers back to suffering from agent orange effects. Some can get disability and back pay when they can show the effects of the agent orange

Snook still keeps connections with some Vietnamese families they helped bring to Texas. He also sponsored a Vietnamese family who now have one of the most famous singers in the coun-

Snook said he has at least one trip to Vietnam left in him, although it is currently not allowed because COVID-19 is spreading there. So instead, Snook has been writing a newsletter from the REAP team and hosts Zoom meetings online.

"Some of the guys don't have anyone to talk to, the Zoom calls are a lifeline," he said.

Back to Staples

Snook and his wife Lori currently live in Missouri and visited the Riewers in Staples on July 14.

"Jerry and Maryann stuck their neck out for me," said Snook. "I will always appreciate them for that."

Snook has a paver stone at the Staples Veterans Park and was happy to see it during his visit. He also brought his new book to the library.

"God is using me, I have a great life today," said Snook

Looking back at the many crossroads in his life, Snook said. "There is always a fork in the road, you have choices every day. We've got something to say about our lives. You can always make a conscious decision to choose life."

"God's always looked over me," said Snook. "I have been tested and came out a better person."
