DAY ONE, JUNE 4 - For us the beginning of a very long day, but for the men and women of all the Armed Forces combined it was a much longer day. As in the movie title, "The Longest Day.'

After an eight hour flight from Minneapolis we arrived in Degaule Airport. We had a rental car ordered last year, but the agency messed that up so after waiting for two and a half hours we finally got our car...a small SUV that was such a tight fit it was hard to breathe.

We set out for Orbec. France to our hotel for the next two days. The rooms were about as small as the car. We found the only place to eat at a pizza shop. On the way over there we got the French chewing out of the year at the toll booth. A very nice French man came to our rescue and ended up chewing out the French guy yelling at us. It was an absolute hoot, couldn't stop laughing. That story carried through our entire trip.

Day Two, June 5 - Early rise at 7 a.m., the way to get the day started is with breakfast and strong coffee. We were off and on the way to Omaha Beach. Not too many people there yet, but the Scottish bag pipe player started to play "Amazing Grace" while standing in six inches of water, we found out that this was the beginning of the ceremony on Omaha Beach. That was very moving. We talked to a couple of the original servicemen that had landed on Omaha, and a lot of other people from France, Belgium, America all very interested in the

Band of Relatives. They "D Day Experience." We saw many reenactors, from all parts of the war. Lady officers, nurses, soldiers of all branches and foreign service people. We went as the Band of Relatives and saw the reenactors from "The Band of Brothers." That was neat.

We then drove up to the National Cemetery at Omaha Beach. We walked all the way around this huge beautiful place. It was very reverent and everyone was being very respectful. The cemetery overlooks the Omaha Beach where they came ashore. This is June 5, and the place was crowded, can't imagine what June 6 was going to be like with all the dignitaries that were coming.

We understand now that it went very well. I got the privilege thanks to my press pass from the Staples World to step over the fence and ask if I could place a flag on one of the graves and they let me do it. It was a real honor to me to be able to do that.

We then traveled to Sannerville, France to watch the paratroopers jump from the C-47's. It started with a British 'Spitfire' buzzing the field many times as precursor to the jump. Four planes came over us five times and dropped paratroopers out the hatch. We hadn't eaten anything, so we started to walk to town and someone told us the best was yet to come, we turned around and went back up front at the fence. We waited three and a half hours for the finale which was well worth the wait. This is when Warren Johnson (Staples resident for many years) jumped from

Motley Fire and Rescue hosts mock vehicle accident training

Motley Fire and Rescue hosted a mock vehicle accident training recently, off 120th St. SW in rural

Others participating in the event included the Staples Ambulance and the Motley Police Department. North Memorial Air Care was originally scheduled to be a part of the training, but they were called to a real accident at that time.

Jace Carlson, Motley Fire Department's (MFD) 2nd Asst. Chief and Training Officer, organized the event which he described as "a great success."

The scenario of the mock one-vehicle accident was as follows: The driver of the vehicle had a diabetic incident which resulted in the car leaving the roadway and crashing into a wooded area. One person was ejected from the vehicle and three others were still inside when emergency crews arrived. In addition, two pedestrians were hit and needed medical attention.

Playing the parts of the victims were CJ Hanson, Kai Gelle, Garrett Carlson, Dusty Koval, Jordon Carlson and Bella Martin. Holly Carlson, Jace Carlson's wife, assisted with their costumes and make-

Some of the things firefighters worked on during the training included stabilizing the vehicle prior to the ambulance crews' arrival, using the Jaws of Life to pry open the vehicle, assisting with treating and preparing patients for transportation and setting up the landing zone for air care. In addition, they worked to keep communication open between the fire department, law enforcement, ambu- I talked to said it was a lance, air care and other resources as needed

Bryan Stevens was the acting MFD Fire Chief for the event. Other participating firefighters included Chuck Gerads, Nathan Thiede, Karen Thiede. Tim Schneider, Nick Dille, Todd Judd, Mike Zimmerman, Jace Carlson, Randy Nelson and Brad Olson.

The training was a joint effort with the Staples Ambulance EMT's, of which Kurt Weishair was the acting lead EMT. Jace Carlson said that in preparing the scene, Weishair gave him a list of some of the injuries they would like to have included in the training.

As the EMT's arrived at the scene, they were taught to assess and prioritize the situation, stabilize the victims and treat them as they are able.

"They were a big part of the training," Jace Carlson said of the EMT's. "We work with them on a lot of different calls, so if we can get together for a few trainings it makes us a stronger


"I thought the training was a success," Jace Carlson said. He went on to note that with six 'victims'. three of which needed extrication, they were only on the scene for one hour and during that time all of the patients were secured and transported to where they needed to go. "I call that a win," Jace Carlson went on. "Everyone that great exercise and that we should do more trainings like this one. It helps build on teamwork between the different agencies."

Jace Carlson said that he appreciated everyone that helped with setting this mock accident up and felt everyone did a great

Tri-County moves past fairgrounds possiblity

Care has been considering the Wadena County Fairgrounds as a potential site for its new facility, but a cost analysis on what it would take to move the current fair has caused Tri-County to move in another direction. The cost to relocate the fair, including moving the race track, relocating or rebuilding

Tri-County Health current buildings, adding a parking lot and more, totaled \$13.1 million. This price is well beyond what was anticipated or budgeted.

Instead, Tri-County has turned its focus to a property of more than 70 acres on Highway 10 west of Wadena owned by Kelly and Julie Taggart. Tri-County already has a purchase order agreement on the property, which offers more visibility than the fairgrounds and has a country atmosphere that would help in creating a place of healing. In addition, the cost came in at \$2 million, significantly less than the \$13.1 million project for the fairgrounds.

The Taggart property resides in Otter Tail County, though Tri-County's goal had been to remain in Wadena County. Should Tri-County purchase the land, steps would be taken to annex the property into the city of Wadena. However, it would remain in Otter Tail County.

Before zeroing in on the Taggart property, Tri-County considered other options within Wadena County. It researched the option of co-locating with the fair, but this presents another cost concern as well as potential noise interference from the race track. Another possibility was the property south of Wadena on Highway 71 that formerly housed the drivein movie theater. However, this property does not offer the visibility and location on Highway 10, which was a primary goal in Tri-County's master planning.

move farther east, as that would place it within 20 miles of Lakewood Health System in Staples. In the past, CMS (Medicare) has looked at 5-mile increments as it comes to Critical Access Hospital reimbursements and their distance from one another. Being within 20 miles of Lakewood could have financial consequences for both healthcare systems, which could jeopardize their future viability from a federal reimbursement perspective.

At this time, Tri-County Health Care will move forward in pursuing the Taggart property. The next step is the due diligence process, which will determine the viability of the property. Though it will prioritize the work on the Taggart property, Tri-County is keeping communication open with property owners and the county for the possibility of a Plan B option.

"I want to say thank you to Wadena County, the Fair Board, and the city of Wadena for their partnership and collaboration in researching a location for our new facility," said Joel Beiswenger, Tri-County president and CEO. "We regret not being able to remain in Wadena County, but we are excited by the opportunities presented by the Taggart property and look forward to moving one step closer to bringing the rural healthcare center of the future to the communities we serve in Wadena, Todd and Otter Tail coun-

• July 6, 1944 - Caroline Hanson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Hanson of Leader, was seriously injured Sunday afternoon of last week while playing baseball with a number of neighbor children at her home. One of the boys was at bat, and when he swung his bat, it slipped out of his hand, flew several feet and struck Caroline in the forehead with such force that the bat was broken.

Caroline was rushed to the Staples Municipal hospital and a complete examination was given. Several stitches were taken in her forehead, and she was taken home that evening. She is getting along as well as can be expected at the present time.

50 YEARS Ago - 1969

• July 3, 1969 - Building construction in the Staples area is progressing very well this summer according to all reports. One of the major projects underway is the new addition to the Staples Area Vocational-Technical School. When completed, the building will add an additional 26,000 square feet of space to the existing buildings of the school.

Also well under construction is the new home of the Lakewood Clinic and will house the offices of four medical doctors, Dr. T. J. Lelwica, Dr. William I. Mennis, Dr. Jack Muus and Mr. James Thompson, and one dentist, Dr. John Gorton. When completed, the new clinic will have 29 rooms, plus waiting areas. There will be 14 examining rooms, 3 operatories, six offices, two waiting rooms, X-ray room, lounge, laboratory and business office

Local officials reported that many new homes are also being constructed in the Staples area, both inside and outside of the city limits, making this a big year for construction and good evidence that Staples is a progressive city.



25 YEARS Ago - 1994

• July 7, 1994 - The new board of Staples Motley Independent School District #2170 met for the first time in their organizational meeting Tuesday evening in Staples.

Hardly any item passed without discussion, but most of the questions were requests for information. The boards of the former Motley and Staples school districts learned how the other did business as they decided together on courses of action for the new district.

The consolidation agreement of the two districts calls for a 12-member board for the first two years, then the elimination of two seats each year until



• July 7, 1994 - With a crash that was heard blocks away, Motley's old water tower came tumbling down last Thursday, removing a 32-year-old landmark in Motley. The old water tower had not been used since a new water system and new tower was put in use in late March of this year.

The old system, including a large well, water mains and a 50,000 gallon tower, was built in 1962, at a cost of about \$125,000. The new system, completed last March, has a 135 foot high, 400,000 gallon capacity water tower. Included in the new system were additional water mains, two new wells, and a new filtering system. The water filter plant will add fluoride and chlorine and remove iron and manganese. The entire new system cost about \$1.743,000, almost 14 times what the old one cost.

10 YEARS Ago - 2009

• July 2, 2009 - German war bride Gertrude (Wild) Schultenover of Staples shared her story of how 60-some years ago she arrived in the U.S. to be reunited with and married to an American ex-soldier whom she had met and fallen madly in love with in Germany during WWII. Loren and Kathy Morey of Motley, parents of Mark Morey, said they remembered this event immediately







Media portrayals of rural America

At the recent Life in Rural America Symposium, journalists Ken Ward Jr. and Sarah Smarsh spoke about the relationship between "good journalism, community health, and our collective future," Tim Marema reports for The Daily Yonder. Ward is an award-winning Charleston Gazette-Mail reporter known for covering West Virginia's coal industry, and the recipient of a MacArthur Foundation "genius grant." Smarsh is up for a National Book Award for her memoir Heartland, which shows readers how her rural Kansas family went from working class to the working poor.

The Yonder provides a transcript of their conversation, edited for length and clarity. Some high-

Smarsh said there's a 'great dissonance" between what urban residents and the news media think is happening in rural areas and what is actually happening in rural areas. "If you're a cable news network, and you like conflict, and you want to whip up the idea of cities versus country (which drives up ratings and enforces some sort of unfortunate cultural identities) then you put up a map of the United States where each state is colored either red or blue. as though that monochromatic color would represent everyone in that state," Smarsh said. The reality is not so simple or monolithic.

Ward observed that it might not be appropriate to talk about "one rural America, and to assume that farmland in Kansas and the people who live there have all the same ways of doing things, and thinking, and talking as people in the coal fields of southern West Virginia, or steel country in western Pennsylvania and Ohio."

Smarsh agreed, saying "Of course, there's not just one rural America." She said that those who "set the narrative" often offer a reductive view of rural America, whether through malice or ignorance. But rural America is more diverse, politically and demographically, than

is often reflected in the news media, she said. For instance, she said, about 100 rural Kansans showed up at a recent county health event and "every single person in there" supported expanding Medicaid. The bottom line, she said, was to be humble and not make assumptions about people or areas you're unfamiliar

Many people have no idea how deep economic equality is in the U.S., and part of the reason is that many rural people are ashamed to talk about poverty or poor health, Smarsh said.

Ward asked how people can find information to better understand what's happening in rural America. Smarsh said paying attention to local news was a good start, but noted that rural local reporting has been weakened in recent vears, and many rural people only have access to national news: "We have half the country watching Fox News and half the country watching MSNBC. While I'm all for increasing efforts on the local level, there is something that is so toxic in that top-level system being broken from the rest of the information sphere that that's, I think, a bigger problem to contend with.

Smarsh said the simplistic, frequently negative narrative about rural America hurts rural communities and people. "If every story being told ahout you is that backwards, ignorant, your community is dying, why don't you just leave, and meanwhile, you're doing the work of picking the lettuce in California or raising the wheat in Kansas that's on the plate of the people who are carelessly levying those condescending comments, that is a bitter pill to swallow spiritually and psychologi-cally," she said. "That has reverberations in the way of wellness and health, whether it's that shame or a sense of not being validated somehow. It's related to a general malaise and a need to self-medicate. The stories that we tell about ourselves and about specific populations within our country, they affect the wellness of those communities."

Dig deeper, though, and that picture becomes a mosaic. People and places, environments and economies are intertwined. We are a rich tapestry, each component critical to completing the whole.

For a snapshot of that complexity - and a close-up of how rural fits into the picture – consider Rural

The Rural Pulse survey which you can always find at www.ruralpulse.org has tracked rural residents' perspectives since 1998. The most recent edition, commissioned in 2019 by Blandin Foundation and conducted by Russell Herder, gauges Minnesotans' perceptions of issues facing rural Minnesota communities. More than 2,660 rural and urban Minnesotans participated this time around.

Thanks to candid feedback, Rural Pulse offers a way to explore different perspectives, provides insights to fuel conversations, and raises up differences that may make a

difference.

Rural Pulse 2019: More urban Minnesotans consider rural, creating new opportunities for recruitment

A good job and a balanced life. It's something we all strive for. But are we more likely to achieve one or the other depending on where we live?

Yes - according to more than 1,600 Minnesota residents whose perceptions were captured in the Rural Pulse survey released last

The research shows a significant uptick (6%) in urban respondents who say they are considering a move to a rural community with quality of life being the standout reason.

Rural leaders – let this data be a shot of energy to your work. People want to move to your town! But know, there's work ahead.

Women and low-earning rural residents, however, offer a more immediate opportunity. It's jobs that are calling them to the big city. Yet, research shows there are more jobs available in rural Minnesota now than ever before.

With a rising number of urban Minnesotans looking to make the move to rural, some rural people

believing they have better job opportunities in urban, and a workforce shortage already impacting rural economies, economic developers are changing up their traditional strategies to focus on people, instead of jobs.

People recruitment is complex and multi-faceted, but good data can help you make smart choices on where to focus your community's efforts.

Strategies

Here are some tested strategies borrowed from other rural Minnesota communities to get you started.

Plant the seed for your youth. Nurture and support youth in their pursuit of further education and new experiences. Equip them with the tools they need to succeed in new environments. Help them navigate the vast sea of opportunity to find their points of passion. Connect them with mentor in the community who can help guide their immediate choices, but also offer a first-person account of what it's like to work at home. Help local youth see your community as a viable option rather than a life sentence.

Make job opportunities visible. Most rural communities do not have a single jobs hub to promote openings to current or potential residents. A job seeker might have to search newspaper print ads. Facebook posts, job aggregator sites and more to see all of what's available. It's important to not only have a single jobs hub, but to make sure your target recruits can access it.

At every touch point, be ready. The first point of contact for a potential new resident could happen anywhere. It might be at a gas station when someone is just passing through. A grocery store, bait shop or hotel. It could happen right after a job interview or in the middle of a vacation. Communities who excel at people recruitment are ready to "sell" their community at any of these touch points and more. This means in addition to formal front line service training, you should be communicating clearly and consistently about the community narrative you want residents sharing.

Get newcomers connected. Fast. If you've done your work and a recruit moves to town, begin retention efforts immediately! Work with existing networks in your community to plug newcomers into the fabric of the community. They will be much more likely to stay and contribute to the health of your community if they've built up connections and relationships.






Fast or slow, summer will slip on by

Our sense of time and what its passage means changes a lot as we grow up. As a youngster in the early grades I was sure that summers were endless. I knew better, if for no other reason than when the year ended and our anxiety about whether "we passed"

tations, so sometimes the anxiety of whether we'd been passed to the next grade was replaced by anxiety over whether Sister So-andso was really as tough as everyone said she was.

Still, like a typical child I considered a wait of more than a few days for anything to be "forever," so a three-month long summer had to be longer than that, despite all evidence to the contrary. Later, as adults, when our lives overflow with duties and obligations, just the opposite seems true. Days and weeks go by in a blur, and time is a commodity there is never enough of. Some of us were warned of this as children, but we never quite believed

This being the week when we celebrate our nation's declaration of independence, or 4th of July as we have foreshortened it, I'm reminded of how one person I know marked the passage of summer as only a timechallenged adult would. My spouse taught in a public school for more than three decades. Like most teachers, she had summers with no teaching duties. People who don't teach are sometimes tempted in their illconcealed jealousy to say "summers to do with as they please." But I know better, having had two children, a home that was always ship-shape, and fast

food dinners almost never. But when the 4th of July came and went, it was her judgment that "Summer is almost over!" This is classic glass-half-empty pessimism, rather than glass-half-full optimism. The truth was, from July 4th to Labor Day—the start of the next school yearwas more than half of her three-month summer. About all you can say is that she saw time's passage as an uber-adult.

Some, like my wife, measure time in days and weeks. For others, time is measured by Nature's rhythms, or by faultlessly reliable celestial phenomena. This time of year I'm also reminded of a retired co-worker who was my associate for more than 20 years. When you know someone that well, you may be aware of things that will "jerk their chain," and in friendly jabbing I sometimes did.

At the time of the summer solstice—the first and longest day of summer, usually June 21st or 22nd—I would rem her that from that day ward every day would shorter than the one bef until we arrived at shortest day of the year December 21st. She li for gardening, and ha keen dislike for driving wintry Minnesota roa so this reminder was s to draw a good-natur but feisty response. I rational self knew that

"sweet spot" of summer still lay ahead. But being reminded that summer is fleeting was not what she wanted to hear.

Not everyone wants summer to be endless. Summer has its many virtues, with family vacations, summer outdoor sports, harvests from farmers markets, and more time with our school-age children. But some might consider giving the season a nudge to get it to move along a little faster. They'd just as soon get past the mid-summer fishing doldrums and dog days and on to better fall fishing. Just as soon get to the "pre-season special" fall hunting catalogs that still come in the mail, and look ahead to that biggest of all Minnesota hunting and shooting extravaganzas, Game Fair in August.

But that would be to wish precious time away. Better to take every day as it comes. Try to solve a difficult dog day fishing puzzle with a technique that's outside your comfort zone or angling style. Try something you've never seen an expert recommend.

It might work just once, or it might be revolutionary. Try an altogether different style of fishing, whether for a different species, or with tackle you've never mastered.

Indulge your impatience to be afield with a firearm by making time to go to a target range and boost your marksmanship breaking some clay pigeons, or punching holes in paper rifle targets. Talk to a forester or state park ranger and ask where you might prospect for wild blueberries—commonly in areas that have experienced a burn in recent yearswhen they typically ripen in late July. Pick up the Friday Minneapolis Star-Tribune every week and scan the events calendar in the Outdoors section for new outdoor ideas

Summer can seem fast or slow, something that depends a lot on who—and how busy-you are. But one piece of advice holds true for all; get the most out of it while you can, for it will literally soon be gone.

Celebrating liberation like it was 1944

the same airplane (Daisy) and landed in the exact same field as his granduncle did in 1944. It was awesome, we wished we could have talked to him, but the security wouldn't allow us on the landing site. So, we started for our hotel in hopes that we could get something to eat. We were re-routed to Caen, we found a restaurant open and ate a good meal and headed home. On the way the security had already set up the barricades on the roads for the June 6 special ceremony. It took us until 1 a.m. to get back. Another very

DAY THREE, JUNE 6 - Up early again, we drove a long way out of way (because of the barricades) to get to Ste. Mere-Eglise. The town was completely full of reenactors, really kind of neat. They were

celebrating their liberation as they did in 1944. We stood in line for two hours waiting to get something to eat and drink. We talked to many people in the line and around us (they were all so nice). While there, we noticed the famous church where "Red Buttons" in the movie "The Longest Day" had his parachute get caught on the church steeple and wouldn't you know there was the parachute with a dummy hanging there. The real paratrooper that did land there was shot in the heel of his boot, he played dead and was later rescued by his comrades. After buying some souvenirs, we then ventured to "Utah Beach." We walked a long way down that beach to an overturned "Higgins Boat" and we explored many German bunkers, a monument to all the brave

soldiers who didn't make it and to those who did along with mentioning the names of ships that participated. We went to the museum and a bar that was full of actual remnants of the war at Utah Beach. We were treated by a fly-over by the British Red Flying team as they were headed toward the June 6 Commemoration with all the dignitaries present (as seen by the entire world).

DAY FOUR, JUNE 7 - Left very early to get to the Paris Airport to complete our stay in Europe. The six of us then flew to Aberdeen, Scotland. It's a story to tell at a later time as it was full of fun and tension. We visited three distilleries and three castles and spent a lot of time looking for "Nessie" the "Lochness Monster." Sadly, we didn't achieve our goal.
