Wadena County sees results in abatement

Since being granted a four-

year property tax abatement from Wadena County in 2015, Verndale Custom Builders has kept its part of the agreement, Auditor/Treasurer Judy Taves told the county board on April 12.

The agreement went into effect on July 1, 2015. For the first six months of the agreement, July through December 2015, the company paid \$96,242 in salaries and wages to six full-time and one parttime employees that were hired to Additional homes were ordered restart the production of manufactured homes at the former Verndale Custom Homes site.

Verndale Custom Builders hired and paid a general manager, drafter, foreman, sales person, lead finisher, quality control and safety manager and part-time accountant in 2015.

Verndale Custom Builders created the current seven new positions and brought seven additional people into the organization.

These employees completed two new homes by the end of 2015. with construction delayed until spring of 2016, due to issues of financing and the end of the construction season, according to Bill Hess, General Manager.

In a telephone interview, Hess said that the company has seven homes currently underway. He projects that 20 homes will be completed in 2016. Inquiries and "foot traffic" from interested buyers is increasing, which Hess is glad to

Many of the homes that Verndale Custom Builders produces

will be two bedroom/two bath homes, which cost approximately \$100,000. The largest home that can be ordered is four-bedrooms with the dimensions of 28' by 72'

"One of the things that differentiates us from other builders is the fact that we customize plans for our customers and build them to fit customer needs," Hess said.

Artist inspired by Minnesota landscapes

Since moving up north to the Lincoln Lakes area, artist Kerry Kupferschmidt says he never runs out of subjects for his watercolors.

His loft studio overlooks a wooded area off Lake Shamineau, with views of green pines and snow-white birch trees. To the front of the house is the spacious lake, frosted with thick ice in the winter months and turning to a shimmering blue pool come summer.

Several of Kerry's paintings line the studio walls, clearly inspired by his surroundings, as well as other familiar landscapes in Central and Northern Minnesota. There are images of pileated woodpeckers, loons, summer birches and a sunset over the water following a summer storm to name a few. The colors are vibrant and Kerry seems to capture the subtle nuances that define one Minnesota season from another.

"I love painting lake scenes, as well as street scenes in small towns,' Kerry said. Although his passion is in watercolors, he occasionally works with acrylics and oils as well. He grew up in Maple-

wood near Lake Phalen and as a kid, always loved to draw, Kerry said. After high school, he went on to receive a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of Minnesota.

It would be several years before Kerry could devote all of his time to his art. He previously worked for American Bank, where he was in charge of their printing materials.

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School district may receive Tech Mobile

A 3D printer, laser engraver, CNC wood mill, plasma cutting table, welding simulator, aquaponics, drones, robotics kits, graphics printer, vinyl cutter and medical equipment.

This is a partial list of the equipment that will be available at Staples Motley High School next year if the district's application for innovation funding for Technology Mobile from NJPA (National Joint Powers Alliance) is suc-

A resolution authorizing the application was approved at the school board's meeting April 18.

The elementary and middle schools will also receive kits and equipment for robotic, electrical and transportation technology.

The equipment for each grade level will be rotated between all the classrooms so all students will have the opportunity to learn about it. Part of the funding is for training the teachers on the curriculum and standards in the different areas.

The Technology Mobile program is expected to be implemented in the 2016-17 school year.

The district contracts with J & J Solutions for marketing and communications services. Sara Dregney gave her quarterly report on the projects the company has implemented for the district, such as the Cardinal Chronicle and the emphasis this spring on pre-school and kindergarten enrollment, among

other things.

Later in the meeting the board approved renewing the contract with the firm for an annual cost of \$29,400. For this amount the company provides 1,040 hours of services. A separate school budget pays for project costs, such as printing, postage and advertising.

During the discussion board member Bryan Winkels said he thought this was a good thing for the district but he wondered if this was enough.

'The school's budget is around \$14 million. Is \$29,400 enough?" he asked. "I think we need to designate more."

Bruce Lund, board member, echoed that thought reminding the board that communication was one of their recentlyadopted goals.

"Goals should drive the money," Lund said, although acknowledging that doesn't always happen.

Dregney and Superintendent Mary Klamm both mentioned projects they felt would be beneficial but couldn't fund.

Board chair Mary Freeman asked Dregney to put together an ala carte list of projects with price estimates that could be considered and prioritized by the finance committee. The recommendations would then be brought to the board.

In other business the board:

• Approved contracts settled with the support staff group, the professional group, the transportation group and

the principals. Winkels noted that they were all in line with what the faculty group received. The salary increases ranged from about 1.3 percent to 1.78 percent over the next two years.

 Approved a resolution to refinance some bonds which will result in an estimated \$40,000 savings for the district.

• Approved hiring a firm to create a map with details on students open enrolled outside the district.

• Approved the capital outlay list after a question from board member Dave Hoemberg about the gym floor in Motley. He was told that the project is still on the list, but has been moved forward another year or so.

• Approved contracts or changes in contracts for Jill Severin, elementary special education; Robin Groetsch, middle school special education; Steve Fligge, high school social studies; Alina Robinson. and Sarah Newkirk, grade 4 teachers; Greg Robinson, high school ag/industrial arts; Dawn Paurus, grade 8 science; and Deb Ferdon, elementary teacher.

"I am really proud of the team, everyone who went to state," said Iverson.


"They represented the

Spring truck weight restrictions ended

Spring truck weight restrictions on state highways ended April 15 for Minnesota's South, Southeast, Metro and Central frost zones, according to the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) There is one exception in the south zone. The spring truck weight restrictions continue on Highway 277 between Glueck and Hwy 40 because of soil weak-

Spring load restrictions are still in effect in the north-central and north frost zones.

Ending dates for spring load restrictions are established by monitoring roadway strength as weather conditions change.

The South Zone extends south from the southern limit of the Central Zone (U.S. 12 – Hennepin County line) to the Iowa state line and east to the Metro Zone and a line following and including Interstate 35. This zone includes Hwy 19 along the southern border of Scott County.

The Southeast Zone extends south from the southern limit of the Metro Zone along, but not including, I-35 to the Iowa state line and east to the Wisconsin state line. This zone includes Hwy 19 along the southern border of Dakota County.

The Metro Zone (Minneapolis - St. Paul metro area) includes Anoka, Carver, Chisago, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott

and Washington counties. This zone does not include Hwy 19 along the southern borders of Scott and Dakota counties.

The Central Zone extends south from the southern limit of the North-Central Zone (U.S. $10 - Hwy \ 210 - Hwy \ 18 - I-35$ – Hwy 48 – Wisconsin state line) to a line following and including U.S. 12 from the South Dakota state line to the Hennepin County line.

Road restriction maps showing the locations of weight-restricted routes and state highways open to maximum 10-ton axle weights are listed atwww. dot.state.mn.us/materials. Click on "Seasonal Load Limits," and then "Spring Load Restrictions" for the most up-to-date informa-

The information is also available by calling MnDOT's 24-hour automated message center at 1-800-723-6543 in the U.S. and Canada or by calling 651-366-5400.

Middle-range overweight permits become available within each frost zone when spring



load restrictions are lifted. Full-summer overweight permits become available within each frost zone starting two to three weeks after spring load restrictions are lifted.

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
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

No sidelines in fight against climate change

On April 22, 1970, 20 million Americans hit the streets to protest the environmental effects of more than 100 years of uncontrolled fossil-fueled industrial development. It was the first Earth Day.

What was intended to be a college campus teach-in soon spread to every community and city across the United States. It was and remains the single largest secular event in history. The sheer size of the protest, along with increasing visual evidence of dire health threats associated with air and toxic pollution, soon forced Congress to pass some of the world's toughest environmental laws, most of which include community rightto-know provisions and allow citizens to sue their government if it fails to enforce the law.

Citizens' rights have been enshrined in every major environmental law from that point on. These laws spawned others around the world, many more stringent than those in the U.S. and most recognize the role of citizens in the enforcement of envi-

ronmental laws. Nearly 50 years later, Earth Day remains a day of reckoning, and now more than 1 billion people take action each year in almost every country on Earth. Some protest, many clean up their communities and plant trees and millions more have their first exposure to environmentalism through educational programs at schools and universities. Governments large and small make commitments and meet with their constituents, while corporations make pledges to be more sustainable and responsible for the pollution they create.

It is fitting then that United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon chose Earth Day (April 22) for world leaders to sign the historic Paris climate agreement at U.N. headquarters in New York. At least 150 world leaders are expected to sign, making it the largest single signing of an international agreement in world history (another Earth Day first!). And it's happening not a moment too soon. On every front, global warming is becoming more immediate, more threatening and more irreversible, while scientific consensus and data on the health effects of climate change, particularly on the poor, mount.

Critics warn that the agreement's specific emissions targets are too low, that the pace of implementation is too slow and it fails to specify penalties for non-compliance. That's where we the people come

Included in the climate agreement are provisions that recognize the critical role civil society must play to make it work. It calls on citizens to "scale up their efforts and support actions to reduce emissions. It signals the need for all of us to be actively engaged in transforming our world from one dominated by fossil fuels to one driven by renewable energy. While these words don't amount to a call for revolution, it's clear both the United Nations and world leaders recognize that citizen participation in solving global warming has been missing. The success - or failure - of the agreement is on our shoulders.

This isn't a fight in which any of us can remain on the sidelines and hope for the best. Unless

we take these matters into our own hands, the agreement alone won't save the world's ecosystems from collapsing, or our biodiversity, which supports all living things on earth, from disappearing.

Doing our part doesn't mean merely buying green products or inquiring how things are going. It means action. It means a direct challenge to the status quo. It means holding our elected officials accountable and voting out of office national, state and local leaders who won't take action on climate change. It means not passing the buck and hoping others do the hard work.

For many, getting involved means knowing how your retirement accounts and pensions are invested and demanding divestment from fossil fuel stocks. It means demanding that your children be educated for green jobs of the future. It means showing up at town hall or city council meetings and asking about vour community's survivability in a climate crisis. It means saying "No" to every new coal or fracking project and retooling those communities for safer green powered jobs.

There are no doubt countless other ways to act. Undoubtable, the climate agreement makes it clear that governments don't have the power to solve climate change alone. We all must do something more than we currently are. Earth Day 2016 is not about crossing the finish line. When the agreement is signed, the hard work begins anew.

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



Healthy living classes to be offered for senior citizens

Senior citizens living in Wadena, Todd and Morrison counties will have opportunities to take classes in healthy living thanks to a \$27,000 grant received by Wadena County Public Health from the Central Minnesota Council on Aging.

The funding will provide evidenced based classes for the community, with a focus on participants age sixty and older.

"This funding is important as we focus additional resources on our aging population," said Cindy Pederson, Wadena County Public Health Director.

Currently 29.5 percent of the Wadena County population is age 65 and older, compared to 20.9 percent in Minnesota. This percentage is expected to grow, with an estimated 33.8 percent of our population in this age group in 2030.

The funding will provide 15 classes, five in each county. Classes will include Matter of Balance, Tai Ji Quan, I Can Prevent Diabetes and Chronic Disease

Self-Management.

The classes offered all have proven outcomes. For example, Matter of Balance reduces falls and I Can Prevent Diabetes reduces diabetes occurrence in persons with pre-diabetes.

"This grant will work closely with the SHIP (Statewide Health Improvement Program) funding that we receive from the Minnesota Department of Health," said Erica Keppers, Wadena County Public Health Nursing Supervisor. "It allows us to work on improved health through healthy activity and healthy eating strategies and to work with our medical systems. Prevention to improve health is important for our entire population.'



VA rural access increased through Choice Act

Great news for the uninsured population and Veterans living in rural communities with limited access to health care providers and services. If you are a Veteran enrolled in, or eligible for, U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) health care services, the Veterans Choice Act of 2014 and Choice Improvement Act of 2015 were created to offer you greater access to care in your community. If you are a Veteran who is not eligible for VA health care and do not have insurance, the Health Insurance Marketplace

may be an option for you. The Veterans Choice Act increases access to health care for enrolled Veterans and the Choice Improvement Act expands this access to a larger number of Veterans. For example, eligible Veterans who live more than 40 miles from a VA medical facility or are unable to schedule an appointment within 30 days may be eligible to use their Choice Card to see a provider in their community. To find out if you are eligible, call 1-866-606-8198 or visit www.va.gov/opa/

Recent legislation (the Choice Act to further expand eligibility for Veterans to receive care in their communities. VA will implement these changes in several phases, with the first phase (waiver of the enrollment date) effective immediately. The legisla-

• Waives the enrollment date. Now, all enrolled Veterans, regardless of when they enrolled, may be eli-

• Expands the 60-day episode for referral care. If an eligible Veteran is referred for care, they will have 60 days to complete the referral • Allows for appoint-

ments less than 30 days when clinically indicated. Veterans with an approved clinical need for an appointment can seek care in their community, even if it's within 30 days

• Allows VA to expand it's network. VA now has authority to expand its Veterans Choice Program provider base

• Allows for Veterans Choice Program benefit where no VA full-time physician is present at the existing site of VA care

In addition, Veterans who receive hospital or Choice Improvement Act) medical services for a seramended the Veterans vice-connected disability are eligible to participate in a Health Savings Account effective December 31, 2015. VA wants to ensure that Veterans have options to access the health care they need and that the care received also fully ad-

dresses their needs. Veterans who are uninsured or not eligible to enroll in VA health care can consider enrollment in state or federal Health Insurance Marketplaces for affordable health insurance. Most people can find health insurance plans available for \$75 or less per month. Learn about options available in your area by visiting www.healthcare.gov or call 1-800-318-2596. Fishing technology - simple or complicated

New or old-which gets the most fish?

By Ray Gildow

I like to review all the new technology that comes out of the national ICAST convention every year. This is the national show that features new products for the fishing industry. The show awards prizes for the most innovative products in various categories and features cutting edge items from rain gear to electronics. It is really unbelievable how sophisticated fishing gear has gotten and how expensive it can be for those willing to spend the money on technology. Most of the items featured for the 2016 fishing season are not so much technical breakthroughs but upgrades and fine-tuning of products already in the marketplace.

Electronics keep getting better

Lowrance, Hummingbird and Garmin, the electronic powerhouses in the Midwest fishing industry, all have updated mapping, sonar, side view, down view and in some cases. straight ahead view, features that keep raising the bar for looking at what's going on under our boats. Lowrance even has a product called "Gofree Hooked" that allows anglers to mark spots where they catch fish, download it to a phone app and send it back to the boat unit to mark the spots for future reference with notes of what was caught.

Rods and reels

I think it's fair to say that a \$65 rod and reel combo in the stores today is as good as a \$150 rod and reel combo was ten to 15 years ago. The quality of these products continues to improve and become more specialized to the point that low end fishing rods and reels are actually quite good bargains. New reels this year can cost up to \$700-800 or more and it's not at all uncommon to see high end rods that sell for over \$1,000. Very nice rods and reels can be purchased for a lot less money and can catch as many fish.

Accessories

Rain gear, clothing, shoes, fishing line and fishing tools are also a big part of the movement to keep improving the fishing experience. Many accessories are optional but the one accessory that I really do believe it is important is protective clothing. Scarves and gloves that protect your skin from sunburn should be considered an essential part of the fishing experience. Skin cancer is taking its toll on anglers who don't protect themselves and this is an investment well worth the

How much should you really spend?

you really spend? As we approach the 2016 fishing opener I am always amazed at the wide range of investments anglers make on fishing gear. I am equally amazed at some of the really good anglers I know who spend minimally on new fishing equipment. They just stick with the basics; decent rod, decent reel, good line, basic tackle, basic electronics and the old standby live bait or time tested artificial lures. Still gets the job done. Still fun - easier on the pocketbook too.

Staples and Motley cities eligible for MnDOT noise barrier program

Staples and Motley are among cities and townships that are eligible to apply for funding under the Minnesota Department of Transportation's (MnDOT) newly created Greater Minnesota Stand-Alone Noise Barrier program. The agency has approximately \$700,000 to award to 172 eligible cities for building noise barrier projects.

"Currently, most of the noise barriers are in the Twin Cities area, where higher traffic counts can create noise levels that exceed state standards," said Peter Wasko, program administrator. "There are many cities in Greater Minnesota impacted by traffic noise and this funding will help address that."

In Central Minnesota, there are 44 cities eligible for the funding.

Cities can apply for the first round of funding before May 9. MnDOT will select projects in June with plans to begin construction in July 2017.

Wasko said future applications will be accepted annually from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, although future funding amounts have not been determined.

To qualify, cities must be adjacent to a limited access freeway, expressway or interstate where noise limits exceed the state daytime noise standard set by

the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA). Cities are required to pay 10 percent of the project

Wasko said MnDOT has constructed noise walls and barriers during roadway construction projects since the 1970s, when the Minnesota Legislature directed the MCPA to adopt state noise standards. State and federal standards are used to determine noise impacts and mitigation in Minnesota.

In 1995, MnDOT developed a priority list to direct state resources to mitigate traffic noise in locations not adjacent to new roadway construction. Most of these locations were in the Twin Cities metropolitan area.

In 2013, the Office of the Legislative Auditor recommended that MnDOT offer funding to communities outside the Twin Cities to build noise barriers. The new program is in response to that recommendation.

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
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
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Chainsaw artists carving out a niche in Motley

If you've ever traveled along Hwy 10 S. in Motley, most likely you've been greeted by an entourage of wooden sculptures, including bears, eagles and frogs.

The sculptures are the creation of chainsaw artists Scott Davis and Cody Davis, a father and son duo who have been in the woodcarving business for over 14 years.

'We both learned from Reese Halverson out of Washington. He's one of the best chainsaw carvers out there," Scott Davis said.

The Davis's use mainly white pine for their creations. "It's a soft wood and the trees are really big, Cody said. Scotch and Norway pine are also desirable woods. "The best wood has been seasoned...dried for at least three years."

It depends on how large the sculpture is, but on average it takes about three hours to carve something, Cody said. "Then, another three hours to finish it." he added, mentioning that each piece is sanded and then given a finishing sealer. Occasionally, Scott and

"We're open all year, but when the weather starts to get nice, we get a lot busier," said Scott Davis, who owns and operates the business along with his son, Cody.

Cody hand paint a design on the sculpture.

"We do special orders, what ever a customer wants," Scott said.

The Davis's start with an idea in their head and then begin the chainsaw carving. There is no pattern to follow, Cody said. "On custom orders, we may refer to a picture of figurine a customer gives us.'

In addition to special orders, Scott and Cody have many sculptures already completed that are for sale in Motley. There is a wide range in size and pricings. The Davis's also offer onsite stump jobs.
