

School building names adding hyphens

Staples-Motley Elementary School

Motley-Staples Middle School Staples-Motley High School These are the names of the

Staples Motley School District buildings unanimously approved by the school board at their May 16 meeting.

Also approved on a split vote was the addition of a hyphen between the town names.

Superintendent Mary Klamm and the administration team suggested the renaming of the school buildings as part of the process of realigning the grade levels. Beginning this fall all elementary students in grades K-3 will attend school in Staples, a middle school with grades 4-7 will be in Motley and grades 8-12 will be in the high school building.

In addition to improving stu-

dent achievement the administration hopes that realigning the grades and renaming the buildings will help build a sense of unity within the district instead of the divisiveness that they believe is present now.

Transition teams of school staff, parents and students have been formed for each building to facilitate the moves. One of their tasks was to solicit building names and submit up to three suggestions to a super transition

team. That team reviewed the options.

High school student Sara Oberlander, a member of the super transition team, presented the recommendations at the board meeting. Keeping the town names was overwhelmingly supported in the transition team discussions. She noted that the location of the school building determined which town name was listed first.

Oberlander also said the

high school students in particular wanted to add the hyphen to make the name grammatically correct.

"If you ask Ms. Sharp, she would say we need the hyphen,' Oberlander said, referring to one of the high school English teachers

Wadena County coordinator position cut

At the May 3 Wadena County Commissioners Board meeting, commissioners voted to eliminate the county coordinator position, held by Curt Kreklau, and create a director of human resources position and a director of information technology position. Kreklau would hold both new director positions. The changes are effective July 1, 2016.

The board also created a new department - the department of human resources. Support staff for the department will be determined during the next few weeks, after the county's personnel committee considers the issue of whether to add new staff or reorganize the duties of current employees.

Commissioners gave no reason for eliminating the county coordinator position they created early in 2014. Kreklau was offered the job on May 2, 2014. He accepted pending the receipt of a written offer. To date, he has never received a written offer for the position, Kreklau said on May 3 during a break in the board meeting.

Commissioners also voted to return the job of clerk of the board to the Auditor/Treasurer Judy Taves, as required by Minnesota statutes, effective July 1.

Commissioners, Kreklau and the Personnel Committee will also consider creating a new position

Temps rise over debate on hiring deputies

A board action to hire three full-time deputies in the sheriff's office, led to a bit of a disagreement in leadership techniques between Todd County Commissioners David Kircher and Randy Neumann at the commissioner's May 3 board meeting.

The board action read,

"Due to the increased workload, the need to fill open shifts and provide adequate law enforcement coverage for the safety of the citizens of Todd County, Sheriff Asmus wishes to hire three full-time deputies. Sheriff Asmus is anticipating that there will be two deputy sheriff positions open soon due to one retirement and one resignation and wishes to avoid

overtime issues and short shifts for the high activity months of summer.'

Kircher asked what would happen if the positions did not turn into resignations and retirements?

'Are we stuck?" he asked. Sheriff Don Asmus said that one resignation has already been received and the other is tentative with a June 30 expected date.

The third position

would be to help with the extra workload.

Chair Barb Becker said that Asmus had brought the request previously, but that one was not until June.

Kircher said, "I would not have approved this. This is catching me all by surprise. I am not in favor of hiring in 'anticipation of.'


He asked about the severance packages and about the 90 day rule which he said they apparently no longer do when hiring.



Bear attack near Sebeka

County Sheriff's Office received a report of an adult female attacked by a bear at her residence, in Section 16 of Meadow Township, northeast of Sebeka.

Catherine Hanson, 59, of Sebeka, had been on the deck of her house when the bear attacked. It appeared the bear was a sow and had cubs. She was knocked down by the bear and received numerous injuries. When the bear stopped the attack, she was able to get back into her home and call 911.

When law enforcement and medical personnel arrived, the bear had left the area.

Hanson was transported to an area hospital and treated for non-life threatening injuries.

Local DNR officers responded to the scene and attempted to locate the bear. A bear trap from the Park Rapids Area Wild-

On May 13, at 10:16 p.m., the Wadena life Office was brought in and set up. Further investigation of the scene indicated the bear was after, and destroyed, bird feeders located near the house.

At the time of this report the bear has not been caught.

The DNR and sheriff's office remind residents to be on high alert this spring, especially in the rural areas, for bear. They will be looking for food and or garbage that are easy access for them. Keep bird feeders and garbage away from buildings and keep garbage at a minimum. If you encounter a bear, do not walk towards it. Use loud voices and yell at it if one is on your property. If you see one on your property, do not approach it. It will eventually go away. If a bear becomes a nuisance, contact your local DNR Officer.

The Wadena County Sheriff's Dept. was assisted on scene by Sebeka First Responders, Tri-County Ambulance and DNR.



Meth arrest in Wadena

Sheriff Michael D. Carr reports that on May 13, the Wadena County Sheriff's Office received information from the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) advising of a suspicious package that was being mailed from Arizona to a residence in the City of Wadena. The Wadena County Sheriff's Dept. and West Central Drug and Violent Offenders Task Force investigated the address listed on the package and learned the intended recipient on the package was not associ-

ated with the residence in Wadena.

A search warrant for the package was obtained and agents located approximately four pounds of methamphetamine inside the package, with a street value of approximately \$200,000. The above agencies, along with the Wadena Police Dept. and Central MN Drug and Violent Offenders Task Force, conducted a controlled delivery of the package to the address in Wadena. Sheriff Carr reports, after the delivery and investigation, Michael Gino-Ladon Ricks, 27, of Hanover Park Ill.. was arrested for first degree possession of a controlled substance at the Wadena residence. Ricks was transported to the Wadena County Jail and made his first court appearance May 16 after criminal charges were filed by the Wadena County Attorney's Office. Ricks is currently being held on \$500,000 bail or bond without conditions or \$30,000 cash bail with conditions set by the court.

the sheriff's department, Hardrives, Inc. of Rogers, it meant the health and safety of citizens if they were lax on it.

Asmus said that he has received requests for more coverage, but hasn't been able to provide it because they don't have enough staff.

"You are speaking to the choir. But I thought that you hired part-timers to cover the overtime issue and we still have overtime." said Kircher.

Asmus said they have four part-timers who all have other full-time jobs so it is difficult to schedule them for more hours.

"We have given you approval to take care of the overtime with part-timers, but it never reduces it," said Kircher.

Neumann said he assumed it was the same way when Kircher was sheriff.

Kircher said that was very likely so, but to hire another deputy would be \$100,000.

"I have heard other commissioners say that their constituents are getting taxed out of the county, said Kircher.

When he had held a district meeting recently, Neumann said the people in attendance had no problem with hiring another deputy to improve safety.

"Maybe you should have a district meeting and talk to your constituents," suggested Neumann.

Kircher fired back, "I don't need to have a district meeting to talk to my constituents. That accusation is uncalled for

• Approved an abatement of \$322 for Robert Kottschade. Homestead was removed on Kottschade's parcel for the 2015 assessment because value notices and tax statements sent to the property address were returned by the post office. Envelopes were marked "vacant and unable to forward." Kottschade said he has continuously occupied this parcel.

• Heard a presentation on South Country Health Alliance from CEO Leota Lind about working with legislators on bills related to the procurement process which hurt them. They received a hearing in the Senate, but not at the House, said Lind.

She said they didn't get to where they needed to be, but were continuing to work and make improvements to their service.

They had a net income of \$1.6 million in 2015. Currently they have capital and surplus assets of \$30 million.

They set aside \$1.8 million should their rates not be sufficient. This would cover any potential loses.

Enrollment did shrink by about 2,000 members. PMAP declined, but Minnesota Care increased.

They began Healthy Pathways as a new program in 2015 to help fill gaps in mental health services and they are continuing to introduce new initiatives in 2016.

on the workgroup to talk about problems with County Program Aid (CPA) and how it is distributed amongst the counties.

To decrease the volatility they are asking for a five percent cap on decreases. In the past, CPA could jump or decline by 20 percent in a single year.

A letter in support of the new formula with funding to make it happen was approved by the board.

"I would not ask them to move the formula forward without the additional funding," she said.

• With Neumann voting against it, the board approved the request for Health and Human Services to recruit and hire a nursing supervisor to fill the position left vacant by the resignation of Heidi Brings.

Neumann said he would like to see restructuring done in HHS before they fill the position. He said more re hopod search was on this. He also reported that he had received a letter - he assumed from an employee, but it wasn't signed - expressing concerns about this. He said he wanted the employees to know he was listening. • Held a discussion on the payroll position which is currently being supplied by two emergency placements, one of whom is full-time in the highway department and has had to split her time between there and payroll. County Attorney Chuck Rasmussen said he felt like they were putting the cart before the horse because the idea had been to have a coordinator in place to help with the decision on what to do with this position.

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

- Drain water from boat, livewell, and portable bait containers before leaving a water access. Remove drain plugs and keep out while transporting boat.
- Dispose of unwanted bait including minnows, leeches, and worms in the trash

Consider giving a child help, hope May is Foster Care Month

Growing up in a safe, stable family is a privilege many of us take for granted. As children, most of us knew where we were sleeping each night, what the family rules were and what food we'd have for dinner.

Foster children, unfortunately, have few of these opportunities. Too often they move, with clothes and a few personal belongings, from their family home to a foster home, back to their family home and then another foster home, and another. With each move, they meet new parents, learn another family's rules, sleep in a different bed, eat food they may not be familiar with. and start over at building trust in others and developing their relationships.

That's why it's critical that we find not only more foster families but the best foster families possible to help children through their trauma - the abuse or neglect in their families that was so egregious they were placed in the foster care system. In Minnesota, we have almost 14,700 foster children - an increase of nine percent over last year. Most of these children - 12,200 - are in family foster homes. We do not have enough foster parents to care for them.

We need foster parents in Minnesota who come from all backgrounds. They may be single or married, with or without children, renters or homeowners. Most importantly, we need foster parents who have a genuine concern for children and a commitment to help them work through momentous struggles.

While our goal is to return foster children home safely to their parents - 68 percent are reunited with their birth parents or other relatives - they need the best families to care for them while they are in foster care. And that includes foster parents who are willing to adopt the children they care for if the children can't return home safely and the children's parents rights are terminated.

Relatives are often the answer. Removing children from the people they love and the environments they know is emotionally traumatizing. When children must leave their homes, counties and tribes consider placing them in foster care with relatives first. Currently, 43 percent of foster families are relatives of the children they care for.

Yet we still need more relatives and other foster parents to provide critical temporary care and nurturing to children in crisis. We need foster parents to soothe children's fears at night, listen to them vent about their struggles and help them cope with changes in their lives. We need foster parents to advocate for children at school and in the community, find them the resources to deal with the trauma in their lives, and bring them to medical and mental health appointments. We need foster parents to cheer for youth at games and concerts, praise them for trying their best and hug them when they feel the world is crashing in on them. And, we need foster parents who

As we have been discussing over the past couple of months, the main purpose for each Transition Team is to help us plan ways to make sure all students and their families feel welcome as we move forward. The Team ensures plans and activities that take place as part of the Re-Start are communicated to all students, but especially those moving to a new school.

The Transition Teams were also tasked with making recommendations for school site names to the Super Transition Team. The Transition Teams did a great job of talking with community members about

How (not?) to introduce kids to fishing

After an ample half-century of fishing openers, I've not lost my enthusiasm for them. There are several during the year, including the general fishing opener in May (the so-called 'walleye opener"), the inland stream trout opener in mid-April and the season for Lake Superior's migrato-

ry steelhead, which officially begins in March. I can't say I've always been on the water at the earliest possible moment for every one of these. Living so close to many great fishing opportunities. I'm sometimes okay with letting the crowd have the first shot on opening day, then getting down to business when more solitude and less competition becomes possible.

Among the memories of my more aggressive fishing season openers are several that involved my kids. In looking back, my efforts were probably responsible for curing one of them of any interest in fishing and the second has become an angler perhaps as much in spite of me, as he has because of me.

The wintry weather conditions of this year's May opener reminded me all too clearly of some well-intended, worst-timed efforts with my kids. I couldn't help recalling the year my daughter was 10. I was convinced that experiencing a Minnesota fishing opener was only a few rungs below the sacraments of baptism and confirmation for a born-and-bred Minnesotan and I was determined that she not be denied this Land of 10,000 Lakes blessing.

I made some concessions to comfort, and to accommodating the difficulty a youngster might have being confined for hours to the seat of a typical fishing boat. I decided we would

do opening day on a small pontoon. Another concession was made in the belief that action – catching fish – is important to generating enthusiasm in a youthful fisherman. We would target likely-to-be-cooperative crappies rather than walleye.

The day started as all good openers should, with a pre-dawn ritual breakfast at a local restaurant. It was intended to be part of the "experience," and would also have the positive effect of allowing the sun to begin to peek up over the horizon and begin to push the temperature up past the 32 degree mark. It was frigid.

Anglers talk about "cold fronts" happening at any time of the year, those changing weather systems that can put a curse on the prospect of catching fish. But "cold front" during a Minnesota fishing opener often means more than just a relative change in air temperature and pressure. In the annals of Minnesota's May fishing openers, there is a better-than-even probability that angler fashion will include stocking caps, fingerless wool gloves, perhaps even down-filled garments or snowmobile suits.

In our case that year the weather included snow showers that came in late morning, after we had caught one small hammer-handle northern pike, and a single rock bass or crappie; I can't recall which it as. My daughter toughed-it-out without complaint, but never really lobbied for me to take her fishing again. When I talked by phone with herrecently from where she teaches on the East Coast, she reminded me of this May adventure of ours. I joked that it had probably been the medicine that cured her of any desire to be an angler. She wouldn't attribute her lack of interest in fishing so directly to this particular event, but conceded that "I certainly remember that opening day." I could sense the diplomatic smile on her face half a continent away.

I have a picture somewhere of my son, probably also about age 10, crouched on a huge boulder, one ample enough to accommodate his small body. This boulder split the frothy current of a trout stream where we had come on the opening day of that particular season. You can tell from the picture that the stream was turbid from the load of sediment it carried, characteristic of the early season, when snowmelt is still filling the stream's banks and bringing soil into this twisting watercourse.

Such conditions are not rare on mid-April trout season openers. In fact you may have to contend not only with murky water, but ice in your rod's line guides, and dwindling snowbanks in the shady places. On this particular stream in April, also to be contended with is a heavy spawning run of suckers that make it very difficult to catch trout, which of course are the object of most anglers' efforts. Into this chill, unfavorable fishing environment I put my young son, who waded about in waders too tall for him, hooked only a sucker rather than a trout, but complained not a bit through the experience.

He and I did not fish together during junior high and high school years, years filled mostly with sports and friends and learning about life's relationships. Then, during his four years as a college undergraduate, we began to fish occasionally together, and continued more regularly through his three years of graduate school. To the point where now our fishing outings are expected, if not as frequent as we would like. I'm not sure whether I planted a seed there on that mid-stream rock some 15 years ago, or whether it took years for the memory of it to fade, and for him to come to the conclusion that fishing could actually be fun and rewarding, and that was something he was meant to do.



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
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




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Athletes go for gold at **Area 5 Special Olympics**
