Reopening is happening with precautions

By now, most restaurants have been allowed to reopen to customers, with limited seating indoors and expanded seating outdoors. Hair salons are also open by following social distancing guidelines.

At the May 26, 2020 Staples Economic Development Authority meeting, ED Director Melissa Radermacher said she's visited each of the bars and restaurants in Staples to makeing sure they have their preparedness plans ready to go, which including hand sanitizers and masks. She said she would also visit hair salons to see if they need

help with their plans. The EDA also approved a loan fund to help restaurants restock their inventory after being closed for

months. "They had no revenue for three months and now they have to create new outdoor seating," said Radermacher.

Work on that front was revealed at the Staples Chamber of Commerce videoconference when LEAP Marketing and Tourism Coordinator Renee Kroll said both hardware stores have agreed to help provide chairs, tables and benches for outdoor seating and later the restaurants will need more permanent fencing.

"We will have people walking the streets this summer, we want them to feel that they can go to restaurants," said Kroll.

She said the marketing committee is also working on promoting outdoor activities such as the golf course.

"When peole come to our

town, they will be able to say

we are a town that stands

behind our businesses,' said Kroll.

"We will react as quickly as possible to whatever the governor says is allowed," said Radermacher.

Government buildings reopening

At the Staples City Council meeting, City Adminis-trator Jerel Nelsen said the city hall building will try a "soft" reopening, in which the door will still be closed to the general public, but city workers will return and customers can make appointments.

Todd County announced a similar reopening strategy, in which services are available by appointment only. Many county services remain accessible either online, over the phone, and

through email, which con-

tinue as the preferred meth-

ods of service.

Two crashes in Cass Cty result in fatalities

Two separate crashes in Cass County this past weekend resulted in the deaths of two individuals, reports Sheriff Tom Burch.

May Twp crash

On Friday, May 29, at 12:10 p.m., their office received a report of a single vehicle crash on State Hwy 64 at mile marker 2, in May

Deputies and responders arrived a located a 2015 Buick SUV that had been traveling southbound, entered the ditch, rolled and flipped. An adult male, age 68 of Blackduck, was located deceased inside the vehicle. The identity of the victim is being withheld pending notification of family members.

The crash remains under investigation and an autopsy is scheduled with the Ramsey County Medical Examiner's Office. Assisting at the scene was Motley Fire and Rescue, Staples Ambulance and North Memorial Air Care.

Sylvan Twp crash

On Sunday, May 31, at 3:31 a.m., the Cass County Sheriff's Office received a report of a serious motor vehicle crash on 11th Ave. SW (Cty Rd 36) in Sylvan Township.

Deputies and responders arrived and found a 2005 GMC Yukon that had left the roadway. The vehicle had rolled several times, striking trees and power lines. Two occupants were

located, ejected from the vehicle. Medical aid was immediately initiated.

According to Sheriff Burch, a male, age 25, of Pequot Lakes was deceased on scene. A female, age 21, of Motley, was treated on scene and transported with serious injuries to Essential Health St. Joseph's Medical Center in Brainerd. An autopsy is scheduled with the Ramsey County Medical Examiner's Office and the crash remains under investigation.

Assisting on scene were Pillager Fire and Rescue, North Memorial Ambulance, North Memorial Air Care, Lake Shore Police Department and Crow Wing County Sheriff's Office.



Veterans News

The Veterans of Foreign Wars Unmet Needs Program offers grants up to \$1,500 to eligible Veterans, service members and military families. Since 2004, the VFW has provided more than \$5 million supporting Veterans and military families who face an unexpected financial hardship related to their military service. The VFW program can directly pay eligible expenses with no obligation of repayment. VFW also provides referrals to other organizations should additional assistance be required.

After five combat tours in the Marine Corps, Sergeant Dustin Ellison was suffering from the post-war effects of a traumatic brain injury (TBI) and severe PTSD. "I thought [Dustin's discharge date] would be the happiest day since he came home from service... I was wrong,' explained Heather Boyd, Dustin's sister. "It was 100 [times] harder after war. It breaks my heart to watch my brother go through life like a ghost carrying guilt from serving for his country." When the severity of his condition and medical complications requiring surgery unexpectedly extended Dustin's treatment, Heather feared her brother would leave the program if he was unable to keep up on his bills.

Heather reached out to VFW for help. An Unmet Needs grant came through just in time. "I personally had depleted the money in my bank account... this was not only a relief for myself, but it allowed him the oppor-

tunity to focus on treatment

and not stress about his

lack of income "said Heath-

er. The grant provided the assistance Dustin needed to stay current on his bills. More importantly, it provided him the freedom to focus on his health - culminating with his graduation in January. Heather explained that while Dustin still has work to do and will likely face daily struggles for the rest of his life, thanks to the VFW Unmet Needs program, he's functioning better than ever.

Unmet Needs grant applicants must be the service member, Veteran, or eligible dependent listed under the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). The financial hardship must be due to one of the following:

 Currently on active duty, whose financial hardship is a result of a current deployment, military pay error, or a discharge for medical reasons.

 Discharged on or after Sept. 11, 2001, whose financial hardship is a direct result of military service connected injuries and/or illnesses.

 Discharged prior to Sept. 11, 2001, on a fixed income that must include VA compensation for a service connected injury/illness and facing an unexpected financial hardship. The financial hardship

cannot be caused by:

• Civil, legal or domestic issues, misconduct, or any issues that are a result of spousal separation or divorce.

· Financial mismanage-

ment by self or others, or due to bankruptcy.

School board approves preliminary budget

The Staples-Motley school board approved a preliminary budget that cuts \$211,000 from this year's budget.

At the May 18, 2020 school board meeting, Business Manager Chuck Herdegen said they are planning for fewer students next year, so the revenue from the state will be lower, despite a two precent increase projected for the per-pupil formula.

"We are not cutting any programs," said Superintendent Shane Tappe. "We are reducing the swim program to a cooperative, we want students to continue to have the best experience while reducing the budget."

Herdegen said they are spending down the reserve fund to balance next year's budget.

Among the cuts approved at the meeting, the position of Director of Early Learning Services, currently held by Sue Anderson, was eliminated.

The school fiscal year ends June 30, 2020 and the board plans to talk more about the budget at their June meeting.

Building work

Work on the elementary and high school buildings is underway. The money for the HVAC and renovation projects is coming from the Long-Term Maintenance Fund, not the general budget. Tappe said there will be an additional \$50,000 to get rid of asbestos in the high school building.

Tappe said the conversation about holding a referendum has been put on hold.

Swimming back as cooperative

The board approved joining with the Little Falls swim team as a cooperative. Superintendent Shane Tappe said it would work as a per-person participation agreement, in which Sta-

ples-Motley schools will pay a percentage of the costs according to the number of participants.

Pillager and Royalton also have options to be part of the swimming cooperative with Little Falls.

Graduation

Tappe said High School Principal Mike Schmidt and administrative assistant Julie Polak have put a lot of thought and energy into planning a graduation that meets guidelines set by the CDC (Center fo Disease Control) and Minnesota Department of Health.

"Graduation is a huge accomplishment and a huge deal, this is not how they wanted this to end, but it will still be a positive ending to their career," said Tappe.

Tappe also commented on the two months of distance learning required by the state because of COVID-19 shutdowns this year. "All the work our teachers do for our students every single day, they handled it with grace. It's been a perfect example of excellence and upholding profiesionalism.

Board member Greg Frisk commented on what he saw while volunteering for the bus program that brought food and learning materials to students.

"The coordination and cooperation among adminstration, bus drivers, teachers, cooks and the paraprofessionals, it was incredible to watch," said Frisk. "I hope we don't have to do it again, but it was impressive."

In other news, the board

50 Years Ago - 1970




A teacher in Staples since the fall of 1969, Mr. D is reluctantly retiring.

Tobacco 21 is smart public health policy

The CHAMP (Chemical Health Awareness & Multidrug Prevention) Coalition of Wadena and Todd County CAD (Creating A Difference) Coalition deeply appreciates Senate Majority Leader Paul Gazelka for supporting legislation that raises Minnesota's tobacco age to 21. Thanks to the bipartisan efforts of lawmakers like Senator Gazelka, Minnesota is the 25th state to sign Tobacco 21 into law.

tinues to climb and almost doubled among 8th-graders from 2016 to 2019. More than one in four Minnesota 11th-graders reported using e-cigarettes in the past month, according to the 2019 Minnesota Student Survey.

Tobacco addiction starts at a young age. Nearly 95 percent of addicted adult smokers began using tobacco before the age of 21, according to National Academy of Medicine research.

That's why we need smart public health policies that take on tobacco addiction before it starts. Raising the state tobacco age to 21 aligns Minnesota with federal law and reduces access

people. E-cigarette use con- to tobacco products. The law will also ensure the state maximizes the health benefits of Tobacco 21 - and saves lives.

By passing Tobacco 21, Minnesota is taking a much-needed step toward a generation free from tobacco addiction. The CHAMP and CAD Coalitions are grateful for Senator Gazelka's "yes" vote and his leadership on this important issue. Thank you for voting to protect the health and safety of young Minnesotans.



Surface strike thrill is hard to top

Fishermen whose first priority is catching fish know they have to adapt their strategies and techniques to locate and then tempt the fish they're after. If that means getting their terminal tackle down to the bottom, or near to it, that's what they'll do. If fish are suspending somewhere between the bottom and the

surface, the tackle and presentation such as long line trolling with diving plugs– is what they'll do. B u t there's no

denying that some anglers have definite prefer-

ences for the way they pursue and catch fish. A case in point is the largemouth bass fisherman who finds nothing more exciting than retrieving a Scum Frog or other lure on the surface and having a good fish hammer it in an explosive, water-spraying strike. If the angle is right and the strike is anywhere near the boat, the bass's "bucket mouth"to use an outdoor media cliché—might even be seen engulfing the lure.

Why this is such an exciting way to catch fish might

be explained by the senses of sight and sound that accompany a strike at the surface, adding to the feel of the strike that's telegraphed through the arching rod and taught line. The surface strike best conveys the predatory attack, far more evident than the ambush of a perch or a bluegill that happens a dozen feet below

If a generalization can be made, largemouth bass are more likely to be surface hunting during periods of low light, the hours adjacent to dawn and dusk. Not just hunting at the surface, but in waters more likely to be adjacent to shoreline and shallows, where aquatic life is more active than in the hours of broad daylight. Baitfish, frogs, aquatic insects, smaller gamefish, baby ducklings, anything that would fit in those jaws is fair game; jaws thatwhen opened wide—seem nearly the same diameter as the largemouth bass's body.

To an angler like me, whose first tackle was a three-section cane pole rigged with a fixed-length black dacron line and no reel—a setup that functioned more like a derrick than a modern rod—the largemouth bass was the dream fish. While I bobber-watched and caught bluegills and the occasional crappie, I aspired to bigger and better things; bass

I aspired to a real push-button spin-cast reel to mount on an honest-to-goodness fiberglass rod. The fishing tackle aisle of a hardware store near home nourished that dream. Neat rows of lure boxes with clear plastic lids revealed lures painted to resemble frogs, perch, and the redand-white pattern that was a standard, but resembled nothing in nature. Those top-water lures like the Jitterbug, Hula Popper, and Bass-O-Reno have mostly passed into history, but can still be found in the compartments of tackle boxes belonging to a generation of senior anglers.

Another set of anglers that appreciates catching fish at the surface is trout fishermen. More specifically fly fishermen, who catch brown, brook, and rainbow trout with lures made of fur and feathers, tinsel and wire. Never mind that trout do 90% of their feeding under the surface, and take maybe 10% of their food at the surface of a river or lake. It's an adrenaline rush to watch a nearly weightless lure float lazily down the current, and as it passes a half-submerged rock, or the tip of a log, disappear with a swirl and a sucking sound,

as a good trout mistakes it for a real mayfly or a grass-But trout fishermen have a more complicated rela-

tionship with floating lures

and catching fish at the surface of the waters they fish. Down through a long and rich literary history of fly fishing for trout, the 'dry fly fisherman" has been elevated and celebrated as the most pure, the most sporting. In truth, it's the angler who can analyze different situations and catch fish under a variety of conditions and with different techniques, who is the better angler. But sometimes what should seem obvious isn't seen so clearly.

Not surprising, the idea that there was just one sporting way to catch trout began in England, where ritual and tradition are near the top of the list of virtues. It's not far short of the truth to say that some anglers almost came to blows when a nonconformist broke with tradition and fished his flies beneath the surface of the country's famous rivers. Certainly there were insults and accusations. That narrow-mindedness is no longer taken seriously, except among a very small minority of snooty, holier-than-thou trout anglers. Tradition is not the best

reason for a bass angler, a trout fisherman, a musky addict, or anyone else to fish in a certain way. Excitement and emotional payoff are the best reasons. And when conditions are right, a lot of anglers will tell you it's hard to top catching their favorite fish "on top.


Remembering their loved ones
